Year 11 pupils, particularly, have been working very hard. Having last term taken part in a mock interview and considered the next stage in their educational journey, they are now focusing whole-heartedly on their studies. Our Languages pupils have been preparing for their speaking exam with an additional set of practice orals and our Performing Arts pupils have completed their first unit, with an examiner visiting to observe their performances. ## **Stewards Learner**

#### The Stewards Enrichment Programme

The Stewards Enrichment Programme ensures pupils have effective links to the real world and raises awareness of broad educational issues. At Stewards Academy, it is very important to us that pupils have the knowledge, skills and attributes to lead safe, fulfilling and purposeful lives, above and beyond examination results.

This year pupils have taken part in several Stewards Enrichment Programme workshops covering a range of topics, including:

- E-Safety
- Mental Health
- Disability discrimination
- Sexual and Relationship Education

#### E-Safety

Both Year 7 and 8 tackled E-Safety, looking at the importance of being safe online. The tutor groups worked through booklets covering a range of topics including: Privacy Online; Dangers of the Internet; Sexting -The Law: possessing, sending and receiving images; and Consequences of Your Digital Footprint. They reflected on their own actions and

completed activities to deepen their understanding of this topic.

We were also fortunate to have Jack Rose and Ziey Kizzy performing an Online Safety Production, which helped reinforce the message of E-safety. This was well received by pupils and parents alike:

### **Mental Health**

Year 9 worked on Mental Health awareness to promote Children's Mental Health Week. Pupils tackled Myths and Facts surrounding Mental Health and answered questions giving them a clearer understanding of the world of mental health. Scenarios, conversation starters and role plays were all tasks completed with a focus on clearing the stigma around Mental Health. Anxiety and depression were topics discussed in detail and information on charities that are available were covered; ChildLine, Samaritans and Place2Be. Pupils had a session in the Conference Room by Place2Be and Place2Talk who discussed issues and answered questions written by pupils.



Place2Be is a school based counselling and mental health service. Place2Be's work in secondary schools helps young people to achieve their full potential and deal positively with the difficulties they face. They provide both universal and targeted services for young people in school, alongside support for parents and consultation and advice for school staff.

Alzheimer's and Dementia were also conditions that were covered to help pupils understand how they can contribute to being a Alzheimer's and Dementia friendly community and also how they might assist the elderly.

Pupils then had to work in a team to complete a selection of tasks and watched a variety of videos to help them understand the struggles faced by people who suffer from mental health conditions. They developed their own charity ideas, including name, slogan, radio advert, leaflets and posters.

#### **Sexual and Relationship Education**

Year 10 and Year 11 have, as recommended by the government, had sessions on Sexual and Relationship Education. The workshops were carried out by trained staff covering topics such as Contraception and Sexually Transmitted Infections.

The pupils showed remarkable maturity when dealing with some sensitive issues and are now feeling better informed and prepared to face life as an adult.

### The 5 Rs : Guest Speaker, Javed Moore

The Stewards 5Rs: *Respect, Resilience, Responsibility, Reflection and Resourcefulness,* were exemplified in a visit from Javed Moore. We were honoured to have Javed in school delivering his message to both Year 7 and Year 11 in assembly. The pupils that were spoken to, and who spoke with Javed, were truly inspired by his journey, with a few even having tears in their eyes. It is always a blessing when external speakers come into school to deliver the same message we aim to give our pupils every day. Javed Moore is a true inspiration and an amazing example of someone with great resilience and determination in life. Our Year 7 new school council members were amongst those who had the privilege of talking to Javed and having a photo taken with him.

They felt honoured with one pupil saying:


# **Teacher Training**

Stewards Academy, in collaboration with The West Essex School Direct Partnership is committed to attracting, training and developing graduates to enable all schools within our area to reach the same level of excellence and quality of provision thus ensuring that all our trainees achieve their full potential.

In order to realise this vision our partnership schools have made a commitment to work together through the School Direct programme with our provider TES Institute to provide the very best school-based teacher training programmes in the Secondary sector.

The programme will seek to maximise time spent in the classroom by ensuring that the face-to-face professional studies programme is of the highest quality and delivered within our locality.

There are 18 schools in the partnership, all judged to be outstanding or good (Grade 1 or 2) by Ofsted and managed by Davenant Foundation School as the 'lead school'. Davenant is one of a small number of 'Teaching Schools' in the country and it was



previously a 'Training School' from 2008 - 2012. The unique blended learning programme combines school based training, on-line learning materials, a network of experienced subject specialists to deliver pedagogy and subject knowledge and a number of off-site visits to special schools, primary schools and Leading Teacher days.

All of the schools have a track record of working with university PGCE providers and Essex ITT. The working partnership has been in existence for over 6 years which ensures that cooperation between the schools is established and is a strength of the partnership. Each school provides a fully trained Mentor for each trainee, supported by a Pathway Tutor from TES Institute who visits each half-term.

# **Spotlight on Science**

#### Raspberry Pi




Members of the Raspberry Pi computer programming club are busy gearing up for this year's Pi wars competition. Pi Wars is a challenge-based robotics competition in which Raspberry Picontrolled robots compete in various non-destructive challenges to earn points. The Stewards team is preparing to undertake a number of challenges including: The Obstacle Course, Slightly Deranged Golf and Straight-Line Speed Test, as well as being assessed on the artistic and technical merits of their robot. The 2017 event attracted over 50 teams comprising of schools,

families and hobbyists from around the world, with categories from beginner to Pro/veteran. The Raspberry Pi is a tiny and affordable computer created for learning programming skills through fun, practical projects. We look forward to hearing from the team later in the year.

#### **Rocket Club**

2018 is set to be a busy year for competitions as another Stewards Team prepares itself for competition. Members of ADS Rocket Challenge team have begun the design stage of their small scale rocket. The team will use their designs to build a rocket which must be capable of transferring two raw eggs to an altitude of 820 feet and then safety returning them to the ground via parachute within a narrow timeframe of between 48-52 seconds.





#### **Christmas Lectures**

Year 7 pupils were amazed and enthralled when they took part in the science department's ever popular Christmas lecture series. The pupils took a trip to Winter Wonderland and observed flying teabags; expanding elephant toothpaste; the mysteries of the invisible test tubes as well as exploding and flaming methane bubbles. In 'Christmas Delight' the pupils heard the infamous screaming jelly babies; witnessed the explosive power of powders by blowing up a quality street tin and even found out how to set fire to money without burning it. In 'A Very Metal Christmas' pupils designed and created their own Christmas tree decorations using copper wire and beads, after learning about the properties of metals.

After a day of practical activities the pupils watched an exciting documentary about the remarkable life and death of Jumbo the elephant - a celebrity animal superstar whose story is said to have inspired the movie Dumbo. Pupils watched David Attenborough as he joined a team of scientists and conservationists to unravel the complex and mysterious story of this large African elephant - an elephant many believed at the time to be the biggest in the world




Figure 3 - Mr Wood demonstrating the explosive properties of powders - in this icing sugar



# **Spotlight on Science**

Pupils studying science have been very busy lately; let's see what some of them have been up to.



### Year 9: Studying Specific Heat Capacity.

Kane O'Conner, Katie Mae-Braham, Seven Hassan and Katarina Jurigina are measuring how much heat energy is transferred to different metal blocks. They eventually used there measurements to calculate the specific heat capacity of different metal blocks.

Knowing the specific heat capacity of different metals is extremely useful, particularly when it comes to making cooking utensils like saucepans and frying pans. Copper has a lower specific heat capacity than steel, so it is easier to control the temperature of foods cooked in saucepans made of copper rather than steel.

### Year 10: Studying Static Electricity.

Darcy Wylie goes wild (just her hair) when she charges herself up on the Van De Graaff Generator. Static charge builds up in the metal dome on top of the generator and in turn flows through to Darcy. Since Darcy is standing on a plastic box which insulates her charge cannot flow to Earth and so builds up (becoming static) on Darcy causing her hair to stand on end.

Static electricity can be extremely dangerous if it is allowed to build up, particularly when refuelling vehicles and aircraft. It can also be great fun, for example if you want to attach balloons to the ceiling at a party or just make your hair stand on end!

### **Year 11: Studying Electromagnetic Waves**

Year 11 students in Mr Perrin's class worked together to build a model of a transverse wave using wooden skewers, gaffer tape and jelly babies. They built the model to illustrate the transverse nature of electromagnetic waves.

Understanding the nature of electromagnetic waves is essential to our modern way of life. Examples of electromagnetic waves include radio waves, microwaves, visible light, Infra-red, X-rays and gamma rays.

In the 1960's Charles Kao and George Hockham began to develop fiber optic cables, at STL in Harlow, capable of transmitting laser light for use in the telecommunications industry. Now Harlow bears the title of "The birthplace of the Fiber Optic Cable" – look at the signs next time you drive into Harlow.

George Hockham is the uncle of our science technician Mr Hockham.



Pupils were prepared for the types of questions that they

might be asked, along with practising handshakes, keeping eye contact and speaking with confidence. Our pupils are usually nervous before their interview, but leave feeling reassured and better prepared.

All pupils were asked to complete an evaluation form, giving details of their experience, how they feel it went and how they could improve. Here are some examples of pupils' comments;

"I think it will help in the future because now I am more prepared for interviews for sixth forms and colleges."

"It will help me to be more confident and I know how to have a good personal statement."

Our interviewers were extremely impressed with our pupils and their ambitions. We are sure that this practice will have given the pupils an insight into how an interview is conducted, along with helping their confidence and encouraging them to show themselves at their best.
