### New York 2018



Stewards Academy's annual trip to New York was an eventful one this year. After a 6am meet on the day of travel, the students were very excited to touch down in New York hours later. The weather was kind to us this year with temperatures only as low as -5.

We awoke on the first morning for an exciting, busy day. After our traditional breakfast at a local Deli we jumped on the subway uptown to 72<sup>nd</sup> Street. We took the short walk to Central Park, stopping at the Dakota Building and the Strawberry Fields Memorial for John Lennon. We walked through the park, stopping at the Bethesda Fountain for our traditional group photo. It is a shame that it is winter and the fountain is switched off at this time of year. From the fountain we headed to the Wollman Rink, better known as

the Ice-skating rink from Home Alone 2. The majority of the pupils took part in ice-skating with the rest enjoying the hot chocolate and cakes from the café. After a day of shopping it was time to take in the world famous landmarks and sites of New York City. The day started with a subway ride to South Ferry at the very



birthday. Lunch and then more walking followed. We took in the Brooklyn Bridge, Canal Street and Tribeca, before jumping on the

subway again to travel to 14<sup>th</sup> Street. Here we climbed the steps of the disused railway that has now been transformed in to a walking park known as the High Line. We left the High Line and took the short walk to Chelsea Pier for Baseball batting cages and bowling which allowed pupils to relax and unwind after a busy day on their feet.





# Ski Trip - Altenmarkt, Austria 2018





We departed for our annual ski trip (fifth trip to date) in high spirits. There were 43 pupils across years 8,9 and 10 accompanied by six members of staff: Mr Sanders and Mr Treamer the trip leaders, Mr Preece returning for his fourth trip, alongside Mrs Hunt, Miss Tidmas and Miss Lucas, all of whom were set to embark on their first skiing adventure with the school.

We arrived at our crossing nice and early, giving staff and pupils a chance to explore the boat or in some cases the toilets as the sea sickness took full effect - poor Miss Lucas struggling more than most.

We travelled through the night and what better way to integrate yourselves with the locals by enjoying the local

Pupils were assessed by the instructors and then separated in to their groups and off they went, experiencing snow in the mountains of Austria.

Pupils skied for two hours every morning, followed by a break for lunch and then completed their skiing with a further two hours instruction in the afternoon.
