Dear Parents / Carers

This will be my final Newsletter after 29 years at Stewards. I was appointed on 1st September 1988 as Deputy Headteacher and became Headteacher on 1st January 1990. I will be retiring at the end of term.

Also leaving this year are Mrs Orwin, Senior Deputy Headteacher whose whole working life has been at Stewards (nearly 40 years) and Ms O'Neill, Deputy Headteacher who started on the same day as me in September 1988.

We have seen many changes over the years - fighting off amalgamation plans, Science Specialist Status, Academy status and known so many children and their families. One thing has remained the same – the belief that Stewards is at the heart of our community providing the very best education as an inclusive school for all our students. A place where there are high expectations and excellent teaching, where people feel valued and we have a special ethos of respect for the individual and celebration of diversity. Stewards has a great reputation in the town and indeed within Essex. It is a place where academic achievement and development of young people into confident and caring members of society go hand in hand and long may this remain the case.

We wish them all the best for the future – some are moving to a different part of the UK and some moving abroad to teach. Next year Miss McGarry will be on maternity leave and Mr D Treamer takes over as Head of Year 9. Mr T Hughes will be Head of Year 11 as Mrs Ramsey steps down.

A special farewell must go to Ms O'Neill who has inspired so many students over the years and has been one of the most exceptional and inspirational teachers I have ever worked with. She is also one of the kindest and most creative people I have known and I wish her great happiness in retirement. Mrs Orwin is also retiring. She has been a key leadership figure in the school ensuring Stewards "runs like clockwork" as Ofsted said – overseeing all the day to day events and the many visits that have enriched the lives of so many students. She is a calm presence



in the hectic life of a school – always patient, considerate and compassionate. She has been a key driver in school improvement and raising standards and her vast experience and wise counsel will be sorely missed.

Good Luck to Mrs Ginger as she takes up the Headship of Stewards from September and who has worked hard this term to ensure everything will be ready for next year.

Youth Rocketry Challenge Finals

The 2017 ADS UK Youth Rocketry Final was held at Stow Maries Aerodrome on the 23rd May 2017. 9 students from Year 7 through to Year 11 got through to the finals with their rocket 'The Bomb Squad' after coming in 4th place in the South-Eastern regional finals. As mentioned in last month's issue, this small scale rocket has to be capable of transferring a raw egg to an altitude of 775 feet and then safely returning it to the ground via 2 parachutes, all in the time range of 42-45 seconds.

When we all met that morning in Stewards we were excited about the day ahead but we knew we would be facing some stiff competition from all across the UK. At this year's finals, as before, the team with the lowest points on the day

would win! 10 teams from England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland took part in the final. These 10 teams were out of an original 100, so regardless of what happened on the day, we knew we had succeeded! Each team



had 1 qualifying flight which would determine the top 3 rockets, and after many very impressive flights from other teams, we knew the standard was high! Once we launched our rocket though we realised that our flight was just as good. 'The Bomb Squad' managed to launch their rocket to an altitude of 768 feet and then land it in 41.9s — a total score of 7 points! Now we were really excited. As we watched the other teams launch, we realised that we were in second place, just behind Tonbridge School who had managed to accumulate just 4 points. At the end of the qualifying round we

held our 2nd place position and were through to the last round! On our final flight everything again seemed to go well – the launch was successful, the trajectory looked promising, but unfortunately during the separation process one of our parachutes got tangled and a little burned which resulted in our rocket coming down to Earth in 30s. In the end we had a final score of 22 points which gave us the 3rd place position! An astounding achievement by our young rocket scientists – a UK bronze medal for the second year in a row! We were on cloud nine! The Sweyne Park School team from Essex came out on top to become UKRoC's National Champions 2017.

As usual with this group, the students represented Stewards phenomenally and it was a privilege to have brought them to the competition. It's fair to say that we all had a blast!

New York

This year we have run two trips to New York. The first was in February for the year 11s and this time it was the turn of year 10. It was the first time we had taken year 10 and the first time we had gone in May.

On arrival to New York we had expected nice sunny weather. The first morning we were greeted by torrential rain that did not stop until late in the evening. This meant a change of plan. Instead of sight-seeing we went off to the outlet mall in Jersey. The pupils were very excited as they would get to spend their money on the first day. Laden with bags, we headed back to the hotel to drop off the bargains we had all got. The girls had gone crazy on hand-bags from Michael Kors and the boys had invested in new trainers. After the mall and a quick drying off,



we headed to Chelsea Pier to go bowling and play laser-tag. We were spoilt and given the VIP room instead of the JP Morgan executives that were there. A group of pupils stayed with myself and Mr Barden and went to the Baseball batting cages. Louie Pretious was one of the first in the cage and certainly entertained us all.

The second day became our sight-seeing day. Fortunately we had nice sunny weather to walk the 16 miles we were going to walk throughout the day. We started with a subway ride to 72^{nd} street, we then walked to the Dakota Building where John Lennon lived and was shot. From here we went to the Strawberry Fields Memorial in Central Park which was the busiest I have ever seen it. We then walked to the Bethesda Fountain where we had a group photo. It was lovely to see the fountain working as it is normally switched off in February to stop it freezing. We then walked along the Mall to the Central Park Zoo. Pupils got to see the sea lion show and the huge brown bears as well as other animals. The most popular section seemed to be the penguins even if the smell of fish was horrendous. We jumped on the subway again to South Ferry, where we boarded the Staten Island Ferry to see the Statue of Liberty and the famous New York skyline.

After the ferry we walked to Wall Street, The World Trade Centre Memorial and stopped for shopping and lunch at Century 21. We then walked to the Brooklyn Bridge which seemed to be the most popular attraction in New York. Next was Canal Street, famous for Chinese food and fake designer goods. We then took a very tired and weary group of pupils back to the hotel before heading to Ellen's Stardust Diner for dinner. The diner is always fantastic and accommodating. After a short wait they managed to seat all 51 of us at the same time in the same section. We woke on our last day in New York to the sun shining bright and not a cloud in the sky; perfect weather for visiting the observation deck of the Empire State Building. After taking lots of pictures we walked to Grand Central Station. It was nice to see so many of the pupils appreciating the architecture and size of the amazing terminal. We headed to Bloomingdales to get Little Brown Bags and for most of the girls to stock up on more make-up. 5th Avenue was our last stop for seeing the sights. Ms Stevens visited Tiffany's again but decided against the \$1500 ear-rings. We met the pupils at the Rockefeller Centre and hailed them yellow cabs to take them back to the hotel for last minute shopping.

As evening approached we loaded our cases onto the coach and headed for the airport. We asked pupils to check that they had all of their possessions, including their passport for the return flight. On arrival to the airport, one student informed Ms Dangerfield that she couldn't find her passport. After searching her bag and her roommate's bags three times we all now started to panic. If we couldn't find it the Embassy was closed on Sundays and would not be open until Tuesday due the American Bank Holiday. A quick call to the hotel, and they had found it. I jumped in a taxi and told him I have 60 minutes to get to midtown and back again or we will miss our flight. 67 minutes later I returned with the passport and we were able to board our flight.

All 46 pupils enjoyed their sleep on the way home but not as much as me, Ms Dangerfield, Ms Stevens, Ms Pelka and Mr Barden. I would like to say a huge thank you to the staff on the trip for their support throughout, even when faced with the toughest of challenges. Lastly, a big thank you to the pupils, you were mature, funny and grateful for the amazing opportunity to visit New York.

Three Peaks Challenge

On the 16th June, 8 of the teachers headed off to complete The Three Peaks Challenge to fundraise for MIND in memory of our colleagues Alan George and Sue Hoar. This challenge involves climbing the highest mountains in England, Wales and Scotland in quick succession. We had decided to start with Ben Nevis in Scotland and continue back down through England to Wales, arriving back at school Sunday evening, so on Friday afternoon we climbed into our minibus and started the long journey up to Scotland. At 10.30pm that evening we arrived at our hostel and dropped into bed ready for a very early start the next morning.



Saturday morning - Ben Nevis

At 4.30am we got up and set off for Fort William at the base of Ben Nevis. We started our climb at 6am with the clouds rolling down ominously. Around three hours later we reached the summit having trudged through the clouds with the wind blowing hard enough that the rain was horizontal. A few quick photos and we turned back for the descent. Sadly this took us about as long as it took us to reach the summit as Mr Flood injured his knee on the walk (run) down out of the clouds and back to the minibus.

Saturday evening - Scafell Pike

A quick change into some dry clothes and we were back on the minibus and five hours later we arrived at the base of Scafell Pike in the Lake District. Happily the weather was much better here and the views around us were breath -taking. We chose the steepest but most direct route up the mountain as we were running out of time before the sun would set. We reached the top just before sunset and watched the sun set behind the mountains as we walked back down. Unfortunately this meant we were descending the mountain (e.g. climbing down rocks) in the dark by torch light – not an easy task! We left the mountain at 11.30pm and collapsed at our hotel after a day of climbing a total of 1030 flights of stairs over the course of the day!

Sunday - Snowdon



We set off after a cooked breakfast for the drive to Wales. We arrived in Snowdonia National Park and began our ascent up the Llanberis trail. This route had fewer steps on it as it was more of a slope and this made it a much nicer walk. The views as we climbed were incredible and improved the higher we rose. We reached the peak and admired the views, a nice change after reaching Ben Nevis in the clouds and Scafell Pike in the dusk. Some of us then went back down the same route (it was a nice descent on what were now very painful knees),

others went down a very steep path off the other side of the mountain and past old mines and mining buildings. We arrived back at the minibus at 7.30pm and promptly collapsed for the journey back to school.

We arrived back at Stewards at 1am Monday morning! It was an extraordinary weekend and we have had a wonderful experience. It is a poem from a collection written to go alongside a Channel 4 documentary that focused on injured soldiers returning home called, "Forgotten Heroes: The Not Dead."

Interestingly, the poetic voice in "The Manhunt" is that of the injured soldier's wife. Images of war and injury are used by Armitage to deconstruct the blazon form, making the poem incredibly moving as the wife embarks on a metaphorical search for the husband she remembers. Pupils considered how the soldier might feel and how he might respond to his wife if he could. Writing as the soldier to his wife, pupils demonstrated excellent engagement and empathy. They made use of poetic language and created emotive imagery. Below and overleaf are some examples. Well done!



Gifted and Talented

Visit to Homerton College, Cambridge, Princes Teaching Institute Enrichment Residential

Earlier this month we were delighted to be asked again to take a small group of our students to a Prince's Teaching Institute event, this time being conducted at Homerton Teacher Training College in Cambridge, for teachers of Art, English, Geography and Music. Our students were Janet Randazzo, Elena Marculescu and Hannah Furness, all from our current Year 11 and straight from the stressful weeks of their recent GCSE examinations. They were to take part in a Student Panel activity, on stage, and in front of all the delegates who would be asking questions about their particular subject preferences.



The event on Monday 26th June, was opened and addressed by Bernice McCabe, Head Teacher of North London Collegiate School and Co-Director of the PTI. Bernice outlined the objectives of the event and told us the most powerful effect of the PTI courses to date has been that teachers have gone back to their schools feeling it is within their power to change their classroom approach to put scholarship and a delight in their subjects at the heart of their teaching.

The Subject Enrichment Residential is an annual event and provides an opportunity for teachers to stand back and reflect on the nature of their subjects, on what is important to them, and how they can improve their teaching so as to inspire the next generation of school children. On arrival, we met up with Mrs O'Sullivan, Deputy Headteacher, who was leading on the English section of the Conference.

Elena, Hannah and Janet each introduced themselves to the audience of 40 teachers and then spoke of their favourite subjects and their enthusiasm for them. There followed an opportunity for teachers to ask questions directly to our students which they dealt with thoughtfully and with an impressive maturity. Questions included:



"Why have you chosen the A Level subjects you have?"

"What could improve your enjoyment of your subject?"

"Do you look to older students or teachers as your role models?"

"Is it more important to achieve good grades or to enjoy the subject?"

"If you had the opportunity to include additional enrichment opportunities, what would you choose, and why?"

"How do you deal with distractions to your revision from social media and mobile devices?"

After the event, many delegates came up to our panellists to congratulate and thank them for their input to the course giving an insight into the teaching of the subjects from a student's perspective.

We were also invited to attend lectures with the teachers which were interesting and thought provoking for us all, These included an English Lecture called "Imagining what cannot be said in Victorian Fiction" by Professor John Mullan, and an Art based lecture called "Activist Art" by Dr Gavin Grindon.

This was a fantastic opportunity and experience for our students, and it will have given them a valuable insight into teaching and a greater understanding of their individual subjects which they will take with them onto 6th form and beyond.

Comments from Elena, Janet and Hannah included:

"The pupil panel was a great experience and the lectures were very interesting as they were something new".

"It was a brilliant opportunity to voice my opinion on how we learn. Very interesting to listen to both the Art and English lectures and gave me an insight into what learning would be like in the future".

"The lectures were very informative and gave me a good insight into teacher training. The Pupil Panel was an excellent way of expressing the way that I feel about my subjects and teaching. Overall, a fantastic visit and I would definitely recommend it to anyone to participate in the future".

<u>5Rs</u>

Students worked on a number of tasks with a focus on the 5Rs which are firmly embedded into the schools ethos: Respect, Responsibility, Resilience, Resourcefulness and Reflection.

Poverty Awareness

Each tutor group completed a selection of tasks and watched a variety of videos to help understand the struggles people face in the World, the UK and Harlow. They worked in teams to create their own charity complete with a name, slogan, radio advert, leaflets and posters.

Team leaders gained confidence and team work skills were established by students throughout the day.

E-Safety

Students tackled E-Safety and looked at the importance of being safe online. They worked in tutor groups and worked through booklets covering a range of topics including: Privacy Online, Dangers of the Internet, Sexting, The Law: Possessing Images, The Law: Sending Images, The Law: Receiving Images, Consequences, Your Digital Footprint They reflected on their own actions and completed activities to help their understanding in this topic.

Cultural Diversity

Tutor groups were allocated a part of the world which included South Asia and Far East Asia. Fact booklets were produced along with a working booklet which students completed during the day.

This helped to give pupils a more informed view of different parts of the World; they were given the chance to explore the culture, food, language, religion, music, art, history and traditional dance.

Stewards Enrichment Programme

Mental Health

Students worked on mental health awareness to promote Children's Mental Health Week. Students tackled Myths and Facts surrounding mental health and answered questions giving them a clearer insight into the world of mental health. Scenarios, conversation starters and role plays were all tasks completed with a focus to clear the stigma around mental health. Anxiety and depressions were topics discussed in detail and information on charities that are available were covered; ChildLine, Samaritans and Place2Be. Students had a session in the hall by Place2Be and Place2Talk who discussed issues and answered questions written by students.

Place2Be is a school based counselling and mental health services. Place2Be's work in secondary schools helps young people to achieve their full potential and deal positively with the difficulties they face. They provide both universal and targeted services for young people in school, alongside support for parents and consultation and advice for school staff.

Alzheimer's and Dementia were also illnesses that were covered to help students understand how they can contribute to being a Alzheimer's and Dementia friendly community and assist the elderly.

Students then had to work in a team to complete a selection of tasks and watched a variety of videos to help them understand the struggles faced by people who suffer from mental health conditions. They worked to create their own charity complete with a name, slogan, radio advert, leaflets and posters.

Disability

Students has the opportunity to hear from an inspirational young man, Javed Moore, who is a lifelong sufferer of cerebral palsy and he has never been able to move any part of his body below his neck. However despite having enormously complex special needs, Javed attended mainstream schools and his disability did not stop him from passing his GCSEs and A levels and gaining a University place. Javed now gives motivational lectures to school children and students. He spoke to the children at Stewards Academy about how important it is to be resilient and determined in life, and never allow any barriers to stand in the way of achieving your goals. The children listened spellbound to every word from Javed, who is able to speak electronically through his computer, in the same way that Professor Steven Hawking does. After a standing ovation, children queued up to speak to Javed personally and thank him for going to so much trouble to visit us at Stewards and for inspiring every one of us to never give up on our dreams.

Students throughout the week worked on scenarios to combat Disability discrimination and to help them become more aware of certain situations in our community.

Drugs, Alcohol and Smoking

Year 10 worked on the dangers of Alcohol, Smoking and Drugs looking at the short and long term effects on the human body, how they can stay safe in the real world

Work Related Learning

Throughout the year students in year 10 and 11 have completed their personal statement and mock interview techniques. They watched a range of videos to help prepare them for the real world and job interviews.

They attempted their CV's and Personal statements. They were made aware of the importance of both in the real world especially what to include e.g. their school subjects, their position of responsibility, extra-curricular/non-GCSE activities in school and extra-curricular activities outside of school and their plans for the future. They then worked on form filling and information that they would need to know for the future.

Survival

Students carried out various tasks to help them prepare themselves in an emergency situation whether it is burns, choking, pool safety etc. This part of the Stewards Enrichment Programme helps ensure students are using the right methods of administering medical assistance if ever needed and knowing how to help a person in emergency situations. They also gained knowledge of preventing situations from occurring such as heat stroke, drowning etc.



What is Dark Matter?

Dark matter is an unidentified type of matter that apparently holds the universe together, and space could consists of about 68% out of dark matter.

Matter Could be

Fibrodysplasia Ossifica Progressiva (FOP)

FOP is a disorder where muscle tissue, ligaments and tendons get replaced by bone (ossified). It forms bone outside the skeleton (heterotopic bone) that restricts movement.

The disorder becomes noticeable in young children. The process starts in the neck and shoulders then spreads down the body and into the limbs. This can cause joints to be affected, such as the jaw which would lead to difficulty in speaking and eating. The people who get the condition at this level will possibly experience malnutrition



because they cannot eat. There is also the possibility that they will have breathing difficulties because of the extra bone forming around the rib cage, this reduces movement of the lungs.

If a person with FOP falls or has invasive medical procedures then this may trigger episodes of muscle swelling. An effect of this is more bone formation around the inflamed muscle area.

FOP may also speed up if the person were to get a viral illness such as influenza.

People with FOP are usually born with malformed big toes. This is a feature that can help distinguish this disorder from other skeletal and bone problems. Victims of this disorder may also have short thumbs and other bone abnormalities.

This condition only needs one altered gene to cause the disorder. Most causes of FOP are caused by new mutations in the gene.

Most cases occur in people with no history of the disorder in their family. In a small amount of cases an affected person has inherited the mutated gene from one affected parent. FOP is very rare and is only believed to occur in 1 in 2 million people worldwide.





On Thursday 30th March 2017, we were privileged to welcome the Google Expeditions team to Stewards Academy as part of their nationwide trial of their new virtual reality software. This was designed as a trial experience to enable schools to take children away on 'virtual field trips'. The Geography department was buzzing with excitement as students came in for 30 minute 'expeditions' where they got to visit locations across our fair globe.

Year 7s were tasked with journeying into the heart of a volcanic complex in the far east of Russia. They were able to identify key features of shield and composite volcanoes – perfectly complementing their work on hazards in classes leading up to the visit. I think a few of the students jumped when they realised they were standing in lava, however!

Year 8s were flown in to the vast wilderness of the Antarctic. The icy landscape
