## HEADTEACHER'S LETTER

## Dear Parents and Pupils

In this Newsletter you will find a wide range of exciting opportunities that are made available to students of Stewards Academy: STEM events, Work Related Learning, Art and Design, Community events like the Cultural Food Evening, Sports competitions, Poetry competitions, Drama productions, Music and some remarkable and interesting individual achievements. On $16^{\text {th }}$ October we hosted an important Post -16 evening for Year 11 with speakers from St Marks, Harlow College, STEM, Writtle College and Stansted Airport. Stewards Academy is now partnered with Stansted Airport as part of a "Business Class" initiative and we look forward to developing closer links which will open up further opportunities for our students from business mentoring to apprenticeships. Mr O'Flaherty is now the Work Relating Co-ordinator in place of Mr Harman who has the new role of Head of ICT, Computer Science and Business Studies.

Congratulations to the young actors who performed in the Shakespeare Schools Festival at Harlow Playhouse (see p14). It was a great evening. My thanks to the directors Miss Johnson, Mrs Ramsey, Miss Thurley and Ms Batterham who made it all possible.

We are expanding our Music department and there are numerous opportunities for students to be involved - to learn to play a musical instrument (see Music School p15), to play as part of an ensemble, to belong to the choir, to play with the prestigious London Sinfonia Orchestra or to learn the technical side of productions with Mr Ramsey and Mr Leadley. As they say - something for everyone. If you have thought about playing music and never taken it up - now is your chance (see Mr Barden or Mr Reynolds).

Mr White, Art teacher at Stewards, is also our Artist in Residence and he will be working on community events (such as the Young Curators Project at the Gibberd Gallery), with primary schools (on an exciting sculpture project) and also opening up an Art class to adults (see p7). We have Art Clubs after school for KS3 and KS4 pupils and will be starting a Museum and Gallery Club soon.

Two parents stood for election as Parent Governor this term. My thanks to both candidates for putting themselves forward. Mrs Thomas was duly elected and she will take up her duties after half

## SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND DISABILITY CODE OF PRACTICE 2014

Many of you will be aware that one of the biggest SEN reforms we have seen for many years came into force on $1^{\text {st }}$ September 2014. The reforms represent changes to the way support is provided for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) up to age 25. At Stewards Academy, our work in supporting young people with SEND has been recognised through the Inclusion Quality Mark. Many of the new reforms are already in place at Stewards Academy. If your son or daughter is on the support register, you will receive a letter in the near future that will hopefully answer many of the questions you may have about the Code of Practice 2014.
On our website is the SEN Information Report. This outlines what the Academy offers to young people with SEND. This report provides a great deal of information about SEND at Stewards Academy. It also contains a link to the Local Offer - this is a description of all the services that are available within the Local Authority of Essex.
Once you have received your letter and have visited the website, if you require any further information about the Code of Practice 2014, please do not hesitate to contact me at the Academy.

## STEM News

On the $26^{\text {th }}$ September, Stewards hosted a Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Family
Challenge Event, open to Year 7 and 8 students and family
representatives,
designed to enthuse and motivate young people and encourage them to fulfil their potential through careers and courses in the STEM subjects. It was particularly pleasing to see 10 family groups attend and a total of 31
participants on the night.


The event was
sponsored by EDT, an independent registered charity providing this type of programme, and supported by representatives from American Airlines, Vodafone, and Anglia Ruskin University, with presentations illustrating the opportunities that will lay ahead for our young people to consider. Mr Philip Lennard, representing EDT, led the evening's activities and kept us all involved and attentive with his stories and puzzles designed to get us thinking 'out of the box' and opening our eyes to how STEM is a big part of our lives already. The activities led to the main task of the evening which was to construct a crane from K'nex (the construction toy system), that could be used to move the container from the back of a model lorry, which we were told in real life could contain a range of products delivered by sea to a port in the UK, and then distributed throughout the country.
Many ingenious models were assembled, with keen competition between the family groups, before the winner was decided by Mr Lennard to be the Bracey-Curry family group, ably supported by the pet llamas (actually toy ones!), and led by Laura of 8 SB. Well done to you all, and a big thank you to all participants for making it a very enjoyable and encouraging event.

## SHAKESPEARE SCHOOLS FESTIVAL 2014

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose
By any other word would smell as sweet."
(Romeo and Juliet)
"Some are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them." (Twelfth Night)

As part of this year's Festival, two groups of GCSE Drama students performed abridged versions of William Shakespeare's 'Romeo and Juliet' and 'Twelfth Night'.
Both casts attended a theatre workshop on $24^{\text {th }}$ September where they took part in drama activities and presented extracts from their plays. The final performance took place at Harlow Playhouse on $14^{\text {th }}$ October, alongside students from Harlow Fields and Burnt Mill Academy who presented their own Shakespeare plays.

'Twelfth Night' was set in the 1960s during the Summer of Love and this was demonstrated through the opening 'protest' scene and by imaginative use of props, costumes and music. 'Romeo and Juliet' was given a new twist; the opening and closing scenes took place in a classroom setting and social media was a key theme throughout.
After all schools had performed, the representative of the Shakespeare Schools Festival gave some feedback to each cast. He called 'Twelfth Night' a "playful and fun production," with some "poignant moments" and praised the cast for their "fun, thoughtful and 'far out' performance" and the "clear music and costume choices, which gave a real sense of time and place".
'Romeo and Juliet' was described as "exciting, energetic and current," with its social networking theme; the cast "made it their own, by tweeting, filming the fights on their phones and uploading to YouTube."
