HEADTEACHER'S LETTER

Dear Parents and Pupils,

PERFORMANCE TABLES

This term saw the publication of the Department for Education's latest School Performance Tables. Parents will know that in terms of the key performance indicator, Stewards Academy achieved a record result in 2013 of 58% 5+ A*-C including English and Maths. Other notable statistics include the following:-

Stewards pupils achieved the national average in terms of the percentage of pupils making expected progress in Maths and above the national average for expected progress in English. This is particularly notable as our students start the school below national averages in both subjects. In other words, during their 5 years of secondary education at Stewards, pupils make accelerated progress or 'value added.' When placed within a group of schools across the country with broadly similar ability on intake, Stewards comes 4th out of 55 schools. The Department for Education say "there is no statistically better performing school in this group within a 75 mile radius."

The current Year 11 have received the results of GCSE's in English and Maths taken this autumn. Parents may recall that we took the decision to continue our early entry this year despite the late Government announcement that in future only the first attempt at a GCSE will count in school league tables. We took the decision in the interest of our pupils because they had been well prepared and were ready. Congratulations to those students who have been successful and who already have a

good grade in English and/or Maths.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

In January I attended the Lord Ashcroft International Business School at Anglia Ruskin University in Chelmsford to receive a Lifetime Achievement Award at the Inaugural Essex Teaching Awards Ceremony. My thanks to the Governing Body who put forward the nomination.

PARENT GOVERNOR

Mr Paul Rogers has been re-elected as Parent Governor. There were no other nominations. Our thanks to Mr Rogers for his continued service to the Academy.

Important Information

PARKING NEAR THE SCHOOL

From time to time I draw attention to the serious dangers caused by hazardous parking, eg on corners opposite the school, double parking, stopping on the yellow ZIG ZAG lines, etc.

A new initiative has just been launched in the Harlow area by the North Essex Parking Partnership [NEPP]. Their aim is to reduce the level of unsafe parking around schools.

PARKING PARTNERSHIP

NORTH ESSEX

NEPP has Civil Enforcement Officers [CEOs]. They will still be working on foot, but now they also have a patrol car which will enable them to cover greater areas more regularly.

The CEOs have the power to issue Penalty Charge Notices [PCN]. They will take photos from the patrol car and follow up cases where a PCN should be issued if not done on the spot. They obtain home addresses from the DVLA and PCNs are normally issued in the post. The charge is £70 or can be reduced to £35 if paid within a certain period.

You will see that there is a poster on a reception window publicising the use of the vehicle and a reminder to park safely with regard to all road users.

Renaissance Reading

The reading revolution is continuing! There is a culture of reading at Stewards and this has been supported not just by the Renaissance Reading scheme, but also by the other reading activities that happen throughout the school, such as our phonics programme, the "Read all About It" breakfast sessions during which students can read and discuss newspaper articles, and our various guided reading sessions.

To give you an idea of the extent of reading that is happening here, since the start of this school year our Year 7, 8 and 9 students have read an astonishing 63.7 million words between them and have taken reading practise guizzes on more than 2,300 books. Over 4,400 books were borrowed from the library during the last school year and the love of reading is being engendered in more and more students every day, which bodes well for their academic futures here at Stewards and also in the outside world.

Kingswood Maths Weekend

Last term a group of Year 11 pupils went to Kingswood residential centre for a fun packed weekend of Maths revision in preparation for their exam. Kingswood offers a whole range of programmes specially designed to inspire and stimulate the minds of older students, enhancing their formal education and growing their appetite for learning.

Kingwood's blend of outdoor education adventure activities and modern classroom facilities allowed the pupils to work extremely hard to build their confidence and improve their problem solving skills. The students participated in a number of revision sessions



focusing on mathematical topics they have previously struggled with.

They were given a well-deserved break during the day to take part in action packed activities such as quad biking, wall climbing and 3G swing. The pupils had a fantastic time pushing themselves to the limit both academically and physically.



YEARS 9 AND 10 PARENTS SUPPORT EVENING.

On the 14th January, we held the Parents Support Evening for Years 9 and 10. Miss O'Neill introduced the evening and then there were three 'break out' areas consisting of:

- The Core Subjects of English, Mathematics, and Science. Mrs O'Sullivan, Miss McDevitt, Miss Feeney and Mr Plested delivered their presentations to inform parents of the support available and to ensure that the students are given the best opportunities of achieving their potential. An emphasis on the importance of reading and independent study was made.
- Careers, Work Related Learning, and Post 16 Options. Mr Harman delivered his presentation in the Main Hall and set out the procedures and information relating to the transition from secondary school to the opportunities of A Levels at 6th Forms, vocational courses at colleges, and work related learning with employers and with training under apprenticeship schemes through colleges. In addition, Harrison Taylor (ex-pupil of Stewards and currently working with us) and Colyn Edmondson of Year 11, emphasised the importance of preparation and looking at the Post 16 providers and their entry requirements.

Mr Taylor and Mr Bendall of St Mark's West Essex Catholic School, then informed us of the benefits of a university education and how St Marks can offer a traditional, but stretching route, by providing an A Level programme from their 6th form provision.

• The 'Stretch and Challenge' session in the Conference Room enabled Mr King to explain the Extended Projects currently being undertaken by some students of Year 9 and 10, based on their own chosen subjects with a research and argument element to them. Additional input was given by George Strachan (of our current Year 11), Miss Watson (ex-pupil and English teacher), and Mrs Sherwood (Head of Sociology). They emphasised the demands of Year 11, what it is like to be multi-talented, and how to get the high grades required.

The new format was well received, and while time was tight, many parents commented that the presentations were very helpful and informative and especially liked to hear of the experiences of the students.

Some comments included.

'We enjoyed the evening and found it very helpful'.

'Being split into smaller groups was better. The lectures were short but to the point, and it was good to get different perspectives'.

'The short duration of the talks made it easy to stay focussed on the subjects'.

'We will be encouraging our daughter now to watch the news and read newspapers to keep up to date with current affairs and to vary her choice of reading material. It helped us to understand where to look in order to support her'.





Miss O'Neill gave the closing address back in the Main Hall covering the need to:

- Keep up to date with current affairs.
- Keep reading.
- Make the best use of your school (resources, other pupils, teachers and support staff).

STEM News

STEM PROJECT

The background to the Project has been explained in previous editions of the Newsletter and we are pleased to have now arrived at the point of designing and producing some basic designs. Our sessions up to the Christmas break had been weekly and everyone had been able to contribute to the actual assembly of the 3D printer, as well as practice the programming of the designs. There was a STEM Celebration Event at County Hall, Chelmsford on 14th January which was an opportunity to show the STEM work that has been undertaken in the area during 2013. Representatives of Applied Technologies Ltd (AST), who donated the 3D printer, and who have been mentoring our group, took some of the items produced on the 3D printer for display.

Our sessions have continued in to 2014 and the plan now is to meet monthly, and for the Project to culminate in a presentation event at the end of March. This would enable us to evaluate the work done and the successes achieved during the past 6 months. To support our endeavours, Paige Tennison, of AST, and an ex-pupil of Stewards, will be helping our group by attending additional sessions.

CHIGWELL ROW SCOUTS GO TO SPACE

Over a period of two weeks, 1st Chigwell attended Stewards Space School, to gain the knowledge required to obtain their Scout Astronomer Activity badges.

During their first week they climbed inside an inflatable planetarium, provided by Explore STEM, and listened to Andy Gannon, Stewards Astronomer, talk about constellations, why they are useful and learnt the names of the most important ones. They also found out how to find the North Star, Polaris, which comes in very useful during Orienteering nights. Afterwards they made a Planisphere, a map of the night sky, to

take away and use during their camp nights.

The second week, Andy talked about the planets in the Solar

System. Moon rocks and meteors, borrowed from NASA, were on display for the scouts to read about and hold. Most of the meteorites were 4.5 billion years old, older than our Solar System except one which originally came from the planet Mars. They also learnt about comets and Andrew Young, Stewards Senior Technician, made a comet using water, brown sauce, carbon and dry ice, solid carbon dioxide.

Each of the scouts received a certificate congratulating them on the award of their Astronomy Activity Badge.

Scout Leader Tomas Emmett said: 'Just a quick note to say a massive thank you for allowing our scouts to visit your school over the last few weeks. They were fantastic evenings and the scouts had a great time. Kids at that age rarely show it but in the mini bus on the way home they were saying how much they enjoyed the night. Please pass on my gratitude to the rest of the team. Thanks again!!'

COMMUNITY STAR WATCH EVENINGS MARS WATCH

Are you interested in the Cosmos? Would you like to know more about the objects you see in the night sky? If the answers to these questions are a resounding yes then why don't you join us on our Community Space Watch evenings.

Our monthly evenings are planned around a certain topic. Our two local astronomers will give a short talk about the subject, for example on Tuesday 11th February 2014 we will be having a talk about Mars, the red planet, what it is like, what the Mars Rovers have found there and much more.

If we are blessed with a clear sky we will take the telescopes outside and view Mars and other objects in the sky. The Sky Watch evenings run even if it

is cloudy, as an interactive activity will be provided instead of going outside.

Bring your own telescope if you have one and why not download the 'Google Sky Map' app onto your mobile phone before the evening.

We suggest that children under 16 are accompanied by an adult, hopefully someone who is also interested in astronomy, so that the child can pursue their interest in-between meetings.

There is no need to book just turn up at Block 3, Lab 7, at 6.15pm for a prompt 6.30pm start. Park or walk around to the back of school by the caretakers house and follow the signs to Lab 7.

There is no admittance fee.

Free light refreshments are provided.

On a clear night please remember to dress warmly as it can get very cold standing about outside.

LIGHT, THE UNIVERSE AND EVERYTHING WORKSHOP

Presented by the Cavendish Laboratories, University of Cambridge

Instead of their normal timetabled double Science lesson the Year 9 Triple Science class attended the Cavendish Physics Workshop on 'Light, the Universe and Everything' at the Cavendish Laboratories,

University of Cambridge. First they listened to a talk about 'The Magic and marvel of light'. Then they did a practical session 'Experimenting with light and telescopes'. After a break they listened to a lecture about 'What do astronauts do in space?' ARCHIMEDES: SCIENTIST, MATHEMATICIAN, ENGINEERGENIUS'

Institute of Physics Evening Lecture presented by Professor Alan Davis

Stewards students attended this lecture at the University of Hertfordshire. They learnt how Archimedes, in the third century BC, made important contributions to science, engineering and mathematics, many of them preceding, by hundreds of years, their being fully understood.

Most of us are familiar with the "Eureka" story but he did much more than that. The students were told a variety of stories associated with Archimedes including his work in astronomy, his practical engineering projects and how he nearly invented calculus approximately two thousand years before Newton and Leibnitz. The wide variety of his work really does mean that he was a genius.

Alan Davies is Professor of Mathematics at the University of Hertfordshire where he was Head of Department until his retirement. Since then he has spent most of his time working with school pupils, both

primary and secondary, and presenting mathematics and science to general audiences of all ages.

BIOPHYSICS OF VISION

Institute of Physics Evening Lecture presented by Dr Eileen Nugent Our students discovered the answers to the following questions when they attended the 'Biophysics of Vision 'lecture at the Cavendish Laboratories.

- How are photons detected in the eye?
- How are electrical impulses generated in the eye for the brain to interpret?
- How does the brain compute depth from the left/right image pair received from the eyes?
- How can we recreate a scene in 3D
- How does 3D cinema work?

The human visual system is an amazingly complex and sensitive detection system, helping us navigate the world around us. It's an excellent example of the interplay of biology and physics. This lecture used demonstrations to explore this exciting field.


Film Club
