2014 UKMT Mathematics Challenge

We are very proud to announce that 25 talented mathematicians in Years 9, 10 and 11 have been awarded certificates after competing in the UK Intermediate Maths Challenge.

The Intermediate Challenge is aimed at pupils in Year 11 or below and involves answering a series of multiple choice questions focused on mathematical problem-solving which challenges students to think creatively and logically. Sufiya Ahmed Visit

On Tuesday 4th March, Stewards Academy hosted a visit by the author of *Secrets of the Henna Girl*, Sufiya Ahmed, as part of the Essex Book Festival.

In preparation for the event, in excess of eighty students across Years 7,8, 9 and 10 read the book and, with questions prepared, attended four sessions throughout the day during which Sufiya talked about her educational and working background, her struggle to become a published author and the inspiration behind her novel. Students re-enacted the wedding engagement scene from the book by dressing in authentic Muslim wedding attire and dancing in the best Bollywood tradition.

The main event of the day was open to members of the public, parents and staff. The central



theme of the book is forced marriage and Sufiya read the scene where the main character, Zeba learns that she is to marry her cousin, Asif against her will. A lively and entertaining question and answer session followed with diverse questions ranging from Sufiya's writing technique to her previous working life as a House of Commons researcher and of course, the subject of forced marriage itself. Feedback from the event has been extremely positive, from both students and adults alike. One Year 9 pupil, Molly Galloway said "It was a very motivational talk and one of the things that I took away from the session was to never give up on your dreams!"




YEAR 10 MP3 DOCKING STATIONS

SCHOOL PRODUCTION - WE WILL ROCK YOU

Told through the songs of QUEEN, 'We Will Rock You' is a story set in the year 2304. All musical instruments have been banned and only digitally created music is allowed, distributed by the Globalsoft corporation and its chief executive, Killer Queen. Our hero is the 'dreamer', Galileo, who longs to 'break free' from this cyber-world and find the answers to all the questions that he hears in his head ('Why do fools fall in love?' 'Do you hear the drums, Fernando?' 'What *does* the fox say?'). With the help of the Bohemians and his 'chick' Scaramouche, Galileo embarks on a mission to find the lost instruments, destroy Killer Queen and bring back rock and roll!

Preparations for this year's production began right at the beginning of the school year, with singing sessions for keen students to help them learn some of the show's biggest numbers such as 'Radio GaGa', 'One Vision' and 'I Want To Break Free'. These were followed by the auditions, where students had to learn a short dance routine and sing an extract from one of the show's songs. Rehearsals then began in November, with the selected cast members working hard to learn all their lines, songs and dance routines and even attending a Sunday rehearsal to perfect their scenes. Students from Year 10 and 11 also participated by being part of the pit band, stage crew and technical team.

As the production drew nearer, there was a buzz around school as each year group was treated to a taster performance from the show as part of their assembly; Hannah Kizilcan's performance of 'Somebody to Love' accompanied by the five 'Teen Queens' (Molly-Nicole Snow, Rosie Hummerstone, Maisy Treacher, Aimee-Louise Shipp and Poppy Rogers). During lunchtimes, the principal actors walked around the school as part of a 'spot the character' competition for Year 7 and 8. The week ended with a performance in the quad in front of the whole school which featured the songs 'I Want It All', 'Hammer To Fall', 'We Are The Champions' and of course 'We Will Rock You'.

New York 2014

I have now officially resigned from running any more trips to New York, but don't panic Mr Harman has been trained over a number of years to take over the position of Trip Leader, to be honest he has been doing most of the work for the last three years! This was my 14th Trans-atlantic trip (one being to Toronto) with Stewards Academy. I have decided that although I still love the city and love taking pupils to experience The Big Apple it is time for me to pass on the delightful job.

This trip started before we left when unfortunately at the last minute one pupil had to drop out for medical reasons, her doctor would not let her fly. The response by one pupil was "Can't she get a ferry?" This trip certainly increases pupils' knowledge, the pupil who made this comment was immediately sent to look up how far away New York was and to calculate both the distance and the time it would take to go to New York by boat! Before we leave I obviously hold a Parents Information Evening, I give out all the instructions and recommendations of clothes and money etc. One point that I make is that liquids must be in plastic bags (for hand luggage), little did I realise that one pupil would try pouring his mouthwash into a plastic bag to put in his suitcase! This experiment wasn't successful and he did actually take the bottle. This year will be in my memory as the year the snow fell in one lump! After the constant rain of the UK, I was looking forward to the snow and sunny crisp mornings in New York, little did I know what would happen!

We left school at 7.30am and arrived at Heathrow with no incident. We all managed to check in our suitcases and get through security, do our duty free shopping (this group were restrained and didn't buy everything in sight), and eventually head towards the boarding gate. Josh is selected for a "body search" prior to boarding, I am pretty sure that the "onesie" he was wearing was the main reason! There had been warnings about high winds that day but as there were no delays at Heathrow I wasn't that concerned. We



started our take off, I can honestly say that in all my experience of flying (I have been flying for 52 years) and have endured 3 emergency landings (not with Stewards), I have never encountered such an awful take off. The wind was buffeting the plane and it was almost traversing a crab motion along the runway. A long way down the runway we did get airborne and again we weren't going in a straight line, then the roller coaster experience of turbulence. It was hair raising for all! A rather pungent smell of "bad eggs" occurred and we all blamed Mr Harman! Eventually we climbed to a high enough altitude, the seat belt sign came off and it is musical chairs time, so that pupils can sit next to their friends. Next task is looking at the entertainment we have on offer. This was Colyn Edmondson's time to get excited

exclaiming "Oh wow, they have got Pepper Pig!" During the flight we had an immigration form to complete, this year it was quite successful and only a few pupils had to re do them, but Holly Fegan asked the inevitable question "Is Stewards my family?" Mrs Erwood would have been proud! We arrive at the hotel, everything is ready, room keys distributed – I give the pupils 30 minutes to dump their cases and check their rooms and we are off out again. Many pupils want to collapse, we have been travelling for 18 hours. I know the best way is to "keep going" so that we move our body clocks on. Once out in the streets of New York the buzz and lights of Times Square invigorate the pupils and energy levels rise again.

I am up early next morning to get my morning fix of coffee, and watch the city begin to wake up, there are some light snow flurries but it's not settling. It seems a lovely morning and I am confused about the debate on TV as to whether schools should open or close due to the snow. We walk the pupils to a typical New York Deli for breakfast, we arrive, all 47 of us unannounced and suddenly the place swings into action, staff arrive from nowhere filling up the self-service trays and seeing to our every need. There is no doubt that New York cafes are never full, they find a way to serve you somehow. Out of breakfast and the sky is full of snow clouds, it's snowing more heavily now, settling and there are already snow



street cleaners on the "sidewalks" shovelling the snow away. I can't see beyond half way up the Empire State Building and the weather is looking definitely worrying. However, we are going on the subway down to catch the Staten Island Ferry so I am thinking it will probably be better in an hour.

We emerge from the subway station to be confronted with a wipe out of snow, it's already about 6 inches deep! I am sure it dropped in one lump as we travelled on the subway. We can't even see the top of the

smaller buildings and so there would be no chance of seeing the Statue of Liberty from the ferry. Change of plan is called for, we decide to walk up to the Memorial for 9/11 and do that bit first. This trip is usually about a 10 minute walk, however, I had not contemplated the horizontal blizzard in our faces, not being able to see, and although there were snow ploughs beginning to clear the roads, they stack the snow up against the side walk and you have to climb over it to cross! I am at the back in the most ridiculous snow jacket (green, orange and zebra stripe) but it was TK Maxx cheap and snow proof and highly visible, when Mr Harman comes running back, stating the pupils are "round the corner", he goes to check if the memorial is open. I get to the next turning, I can't see anyone! Then I look more closely, they are all huddled in doorways with their backs to the blizzard imitating penguins! Memorial is shut, change of plan again, there is only one thing needed, new boots (mine are soaking), some pupils have converses on (really not suitable), we all need a hot drink. McDonalds it must be! Pupils are given time off to shop in Century 21 (huge discount store) and warm up! I buy new boots, converse child buys more of the same! Sometimes they have to learn the hard way. Back to the ferry, the skies have cleared enough to see the Statue of Liberty and surprisingly there is little wind, it's almost warm!

There is one tradition that must be kept, and that's the group photo on the Brooklyn Bridge. The whole of lower Manhattan is "shut", and strangely very quiet. There are few on the



Due to the weather this year, we had to re-schedule most of the itinerary. Once the snow passed, it was the slush problem, huge puddles that needed jumping or in my case wading through. We did miss out on the skywalk but other than that we managed to do all on the list. Including the trip over to the Jersey Gardens Shopping Outlet, waiting for buses in -15 temperatures (Penguin formation required again.) We



went to the Stardust Diner, for our "group" meal and were entertained by the singing waiters. Mr Marriot and Mrs Ellis took pupils up the Empire State Building and we all visited Grand Central and 5th Avenue stores.

My favourite part of the trip was due to an unusual mistake by my successor. Due to the difficult walking conditions, we decided to subway to Central Park for Ice Skating. To get off the subway we need to be near 59th street, we jump on to the train. I am on a different carriage with my group and realise it's a fast train, it doesn't stop! At 72nd I do a typical Fargeot reaction, jump off the train and shout. Somehow my voice penetrates the noise of the station and the steel of the subway cars - all disembark including a very confused Mr Harman. "We need 92nd" he says, "No Mr Harman we needed 59th!" However, many years ago our

hotel was located near here and I know we can walk to the Dakota Building and Strawberry Fields. One pupil asks "is this where Elton John was killed?" I inform him Elton John is still alive and it was John Lennon (sometimes I feel my age). We start walking across Central Park to the Ice Skating, the snow is about a foot deep on the grass but every path has been cleared. Large snowflakes where you can see their crystal formation settle on us. Its gentle snow, dry and absolutely beautiful, everything you imagine about Central Park in the snow! We come across a statue of Christopher Columbus, where Mr Harman tries to inform the pupils it is the Chris Columbus of Harry Potter director fame. Danny replies "No sir, he's the first bloke who went to the moon!" As I said there is always something to teach these young minds in unlikely environments!

We arrive back to the UK all safe but absolutely exhausted, I spend 2 days sleeping. On return to school we have a meeting to give out the pupil awards. They also give me an expensive fountain pen to say thank you. This was greatly appreciated and will be treasured for my life! They were a fantastic group to take and I hope I have inspired them to travel throughout their lives. My staff were superb; Mr Harman will be an excellent Trip leader, Mr Marriott passed his apprenticeship of trip helper with flying colours (it will be easier in the future as he won't have to look after me!) Mrs Ellis did a sterling HOY job, even though her sense of direction is somewhat limited! Some of my memories are:

- The Central Park snow walk.
- The huge rooms allocated this year, one with 4 double beds (lots of jealousy from others)
- My upgrade on the plane home thank you Mr Harman for arranging not business class but I got more leg room and two seats!
- The girls complaining about their heating not working it helps if you don't unplug it to plug in your hair dryers!
- The snow! Painful and beautiful
- The Penguin formation
- Alistair and Tufail's continuous comments, enthusiasm and charm
- DF's group (we were the best at registering!)
- Tyler Hampson and Daniel Millar photography skills
- The ice skating!
- The fantastic group of 43 pupils!
- My stupid but very effective jacket allowing all to find me at anytime

'THE EVER EXPANDING UNIVERSE AND DARK ENERGY' PRESENTED BY PROFESSOR CAROLIN CRAWFORD

Seven members of Stewards Community Sky Watch group went to an evening lecture at the Cavendish Laboratories to listen to Prof C. Crawford talk about 'The Ever Expanding Universe and Dark Energy'.

Synopsis of the talk:

We live in an expanding Universe - but how do we know?

What does this imply for how much 'stuff' there is in the Universe, and what does it mean for the eventual fate of everything?

Our story starts with Einstein and Hubble in the 1920's and brings us right up to date with the paradigm-shifting discovery of dark energy (1998) and its implications for 21st century Cosmology.

CREST DISCOVERY AWARD IN A DAY

During National Science and Engineering week at the beginning of March the Year 8 cohort took part in the CREST Discover Award in a Day, Community Garden Challenge during a scheduled Curriculum Day.

The CREST Discovery Award recognises quality science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) project work that is done during a school day. It focuses on fun, teamwork and transferable skills like creativity, decision making, problem solving, independent learning, organisation and communication in a real world context.

The Year 8 cohort were divided into 16 teams. Each team was asked to plan and design a community garden. To do this they elected a Project Manager to oversee the planning and final design of the garden. Small groups researching into Soil, Plant, Water, Wildlife and Building management were then selected. Eight STEM Ambassador volunteers came into

After a discussion, our group, consisting of Blessing Ona, Megan Jenkins, Chloe Eves, Tayla Leathers, Olivia Warnes and Devon Abbott, have decided now to proceed with the manufacture of photograph frames. These will then be produced with individual decoration, and then judged by the representatives of Applied Scintillation Technologies Ltd (AST). We are also updating the logs to show our journey and progress, as well as producing instructions for setting up the equipment and the operation of the printer, to assist future users of the printer in the Technology department.

We are continuing with our weekly sessions now up to Easter and will continue to manufacture our designs for later judgement, updating paperwork, instructions and logs and the integration of the system into the Technology department so that full value can be gained from this valuable asset by the school in future years. The team from AST continue to join us in the weekly sessions to support and mentor our group and this will lead up to the judging of the "Best Student Design Award" and a final presentation event early in the Summer Term. We continue to be grateful for the opportunity, the time, and the support we have been given by our relationship with AST and Essex County Council (ECC), to experience what is still the very latest in technology.

We continue to participate in the Widening

Participation scheme with the University of Sussex which offers many activities and visits particularly to students from families with no experience previously of higher education. We have recently signed up again to the scheme and have a plaque to display in school as evidence. We have again submitted our nominations for Year 10 students to attend the annual residential Summer School in July this year.

We are keen to also expand our links with other universities, particularly those in the prestigious Russell Group. This Group consists of 24 leading UK universities who are committed to maintaining the very best research, an outstanding teaching and learning experience, and unrivalled links with business and the public sector. With this in mind, we have established a new link with the University College of London and now have the opportunity to participate in future Summer Schools, Debating Schools, and Higher Education taster days in the new term for pupils from Years 10 and 11. This is in addition to the visits regularly made to Cambridge University and Oxford University, reports of which have been included in previous issues of our Newsletter. Stewards has participated in the annual Future Scholar Awards in previous years and once again this year, we are hoping for success for our nominations from Year 9, which will enable us to visit the London School of Economics and Political Science in June. This scheme is aimed at high-achieving pupils, to encourage those who may not have considered applying to a top university for any reason.

Anglia Ruskin University have a full programme of non-residential Summer Schools again this year and we will be submitting nominations from Years 10 and 11 for these courses covering subjects such as Journalism, Media, Business, Performing Arts and Architecture, at their centres in Chelmsford, Cambridge and Peterborough during June and July. These offer an opportunity to experience hands-on subject taster activities and sample a slice of university life.
