The students who researched their project at the museum had to use a range of different skills. They had to study artefacts in detail such as coins and pottery.

Reading News

Renaissance Reading Scheme

The scheme has been running now for over a year and there are nearly 650 students actively using the system to improve their reading.

The programme works by initially testing a student's reading ability and assigning them a range of books that they can borrow from the library. The student then reads a book at the lower end of their range and takes a quiz on a computer which assesses their comprehension of the story. Once they score 85% or more on the quiz, they move along their range by 0.2 of a level. The intention is that by consistently scoring highly in the quiz, they improve their reading and progress along their range. Each student is tested termly to determine their progress and to assess whether any intervention is required.

Since arriving, all year 7 students have taken their computer-based reading tests and have recorded their ranges and their term targets in their planners (page 51). The majority have taken at least one quiz and the drive is now on to ensure that all year 7 pupils are reading, taking quizzes, scoring highly and progressing along their range.

Reading Week

The first of three reading weeks was held during week beginning 11th November. The intention of these weeks is to focus the attention of the whole school on the importance of reading. To this end, a number of activities took place during the week: A reading activity booklet was given to all year 7 pupils

Key stage 3 pupils took part in a "staff favourite book" competition Departmental readings were held during lunchtime in the library and were well attended by both staff and pupils The week culminated in staff and students dressing as their favourite



literary character with money raised from this split between Children in Need and the recovery efforts in the Philippines.

The next reading week is planned for the week beginning 3rd March and activities are already being arranged, including a visit from a well-regarded children's author.



Bookbuzz

Bookbuzz is an offshoot of the charity Booktrust with the aim of providing a free book to all year 7 students. A shortlist of ten was chosen and students chose their favourite from the shortlist. These books have now been delivered and distributed.


We hope to build on this opportunity and look forward to welcoming our colleagues from Kier to join Year 11 when they celebrate the successful completion of their construction course. Reminder:

Stem Activities

STEM PROJECT

The sessions arranged to assemble our new 3D printer received from Applied Scintillation Technologies Ltd (AST), have continued with a regular slot on Mondays at 3:30pm in the Technology area. The AST team have attended and supervised the ongoing assembly by the girls, while supplying weekly challenges in the form of building a catapult from pencils, elastic bands and sellotape, which could propel a table tennis ball 10 feet, and designing a parachute in such a way that an egg would land safely. Both challenges have been completed successfully and within the allotted time, while enabling the girls to learn valuable problem solving and team working skills.





The assembly of the 3D printer has resulted in valuable 'hands on' experience involving the use of screw drivers, allen keys and soldering irons to mention a few, while programming skills are planned shortly. We have encouraged ideas for the types of things the team would like to produce once assembly and training is complete, and expect to be manufacturing before Christmas!

We are close to being able to offer further mentoring sessions for the rest of the Project group and expect to be able to release details shortly with a view to these starting in the New Year.

STEM Activities

HOW WINGS WORK

Presented by Professor Holger Babinsky at the Cavendish Laboratories, University of Cambridge

Misconceptions about the 'physics behind lift' were blown away by Professor Babinsky during his talk about 'How Wings Work' at the Cavendish Laboratories. Our students learnt about high pressure, low pressure, aerofoils, streamlining and lift. He also explained the Magnus Theory and the Counda Effect so well that all of our students understood them.

Filip Kusnir (9CH): 'I have learnt a lot and found it interesting when he talked about the aerofoil. I was surprised that the most commonly taught theories about lift were wrong. The best part was when he did the demonstrations to prove the Magnus Theory and Counda Effect.'

Olly Lucia 7JFL: *'I thoroughly enjoyed the professor's lecture. I learnt about curved streamlines and the physics behind it.'*



COMMUNITY SKY WATCH EVENING COMETS

What a wonderful night for star gazing. Lab 7 was packed with 40 to 50 members of the community, all itching to get out and view the night sky, so the talks about Comets and Meteors were cut short and we went outside with the telescopes. Before we went out, Mr Young, Stewards Chief Science Technician created a comet out of water, crushed rocks, amino acids, and dry ice (solid carbon dioxide). He demonstrated how the tail of the comet forms by blowing warm air from one direction.

We viewed several objects in the sky including the craters on the Moon, Pleiades or the Seven Sisters star cluster, some galaxies and some nebulae. Staff: Mrs G Wright and Mr A Young.

Astronomers: Mr A Gannon and Mr A Bell. Jack Mackay from Jerounds Junior School said: 'It was a very good evening. It was lots of fun and the dry ice looked very cold. The pictures shown during the talks were really cool. Thank you for a good night' Jean Potter, member of the Community, said: 'A really good evening. Great to get out and use the telescopes.'

Sean Foster from Henry Moore Primary School said: 'I learned a lot more about comets and meteors. I really enjoyed looking through the telescopes and I even spotted a shooting star (meteor)! Epic!' **Matthew Allen from Epping Forest College** said: 'I

Able, Gifted and Talented News

We have continued our weekly breakfast club meetings with groups from the Able, Gifted and Talented students. The groups will be rotated within the individual year cohorts in the New Year. We have encouraged group discussions and subjects have involved online safety, CV's, career ambitions, and things that are going well or not so well at school. A very positive outcome has been the invitation to students to participate in an Extended Project alongside their GCSE subjects. These Projects involve researching and producing a 2000 word essay on a subject of the student's choice. This could be virtually anything but would typically involve an in depth study of an aspect of a student's particular interest. Mr King will be running these weekly sessions. This opportunity will enable students to obtain an additional qualification and important experience in researching which will help immensely when it comes to applying to colleges, 6th forms and universities, who recognise the benefits these qualifications represent.

VISIT TO EMMANUEL COLLEGE, CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY 5TH NOVEMBER.

We were able to offer a visit to Cambridge University and included an invitation to the girls of the STEM Project, with the final number of students participating totalling 25.

We travelled in two minibuses and made excellent time to arrive promptly and in readiness to be met by Lizzie who has been our contact at Emmanuel College.

Lizzie took us to the reception room where she welcomed us to Emmanuel College and explained that she is an ex student of Cambridge but had returned to work for the university in their outreach team. She gave us a description of the college and what it is like to study and live in the university environment. The University consists of 29 colleges throughout Cambridge and the buildings range from the medieval to the late twentieth century The gardens have extensive lawns, magnificent and rare trees, and ponds separated by only a few yards from the city centre. One of the trees is reputed to be the oldest in Cambridge. Our first activity was to be shown the Museum of Classical Archaeology. We were given a tour by our guide who was very passionate and knowledgeable about everything in the museum. Our lunch was taken in one of the dedicated rooms but we could see the dining areas for the students consisting of tables in a long room with old portrait paintings on the wall and was a very traditional setting.





After lunch we assembled in a modern room to hear a presentation from Lizzie about how to get to Cambridge University and what the entry requirements were for particular degree courses and the interactive element was particularly useful in assisting our understanding and interest in the process. The university experience allows students to gain independence and to meet other students from many different places and make new friends for life. There is the opportunity to study subjects that are needed for specific careers or subjects that are really enjoyed. We were encouraged to think of questions to ask the undergraduate students who were to be with us after our tour of the college.

We split into four groups and were shown the college in more detail although we were not able to see inside the accommodation. We saw the library and the bar and social centre where activities take place regularly including fancy dress and special events during 'freshers' week at the beginning of the new year in September/October.

We were then able to ask our questions of the undergraduates and this was a very informative and enjoyable session with all of our queries were answered.

We departed from Cambridge just after 3pm and arrived back at school at 4pm.






