Dear Parents and Pupils,

This has been an eventful term and I am sure everyone is looking forward to the Easter holiday. Congratulations to the Performing Arts team and all the performers:- singers, dancers and musicians, who put on a wonderful production of 'Grease'. We enjoyed a lively, joyful atmosphere and audiences loved every minute of some excellent performances. From set design to costume, sound and lighting to the back stage crew, the School Production is the result of a whole school team effort and its success is due to a lot of hard work over months of rehearsals. To be part of it is to create lasting memories and a real sense of achievement. My thanks to Miss Johnson and Ms Batterham, the co-directors, to all the supporting staff and to all the pupils who have been involved. Our School Production is always a highlight of the school year and this year's show was one of the best.

My congratulations also to the Science team. We have achieved the **'Gold'** standard in our work as a **Lead Space School** (one of only 13 nationwide). The Science extra-curricular programme is amazing with regular visits, speakers and community astronomy events. My thanks to Mrs Wright, Curriculum development technician and the Science department for putting together such an interesting range of Science activities throughout the year.

In the last Newsletter in February, I told you about 3 submissions made by Stewards for national awards. I am delighted to tell you that we have been successful in all of them.

- 1. We have achieved recognition as a **Flagship School** with the **Inclusion Quality Mark.** This followed a rigorous 2 day assessment. I am delighted with the report (available to see on the school web-site) which recognises the commitment of all staff providing high standards of education for all pupils, whatever their ability. The assessor wrote: *"personalisation and inclusion are at the core of what Stewards does...the school is dedicated to the needs of students, parents and the local community and caters very well for all."* He goes on to say Stewards has a committed staff, a happy environment and there is total confidence in the ethos and provision of the school from parents. My thanks to Mr Naunton, Inclusion Manager, who put together our very detailed submission. In times of ever increasing pressures in education, it is important to celebrate this achievement as a success story for all young people and to recognise the dedication of Stewards staff (teachers and associate staff) which makes it all possible.
- 2. Our **International School Status** has been renewed and we now act as an **ambassador school**, supporting other schools in their efforts to develop a curriculum and activities with an International dimension. My thanks to Mr Hickman, International Dimension Co-ordinator who leads this aspect of our work.
- 3. The English department has achieved Subject Leadership status with the Prince's Teaching Institute for curriculum development and teacher research in the creation of an exciting learning programme called "Shakespeare in Love." Stewards English department is now one of only 33 subject departments in the country to achieve this prestigious award. We are naturally delighted. My thanks go to Mrs O'Sullivan and the English department whose love of their subject is clear for all to see.

Parents may have heard of a Government funding stream to schools called "**Pupil Premium.**" This funding is designed to help schools support children who have been eligible for free school meals over the last 6 years and to put in place interventions which may accelerate their learning and progress. We have developed a range of interventions using this funding; for example, 1:1 tuition, 1:3 tuition, reading programmes, phonics tuition in English to help with basic literacy skills, additional staffing to create smaller groups in English and Maths and more specialist Learning Support Assistants. The support provided is overseen by Mrs Ginger, Assistant Headteacher and Mrs Burgoine, Interventions Officer who administers the whole programme. Mr Ginger, Reading Manager, oversees a very successful Renaissance Reading Scheme in Years 7-8 and we are confident this will soon be showing marked success. If any parent would like to know more about the support programme please contact Mrs Ginger at the school.



Finally I would like to pass on my very best wishes to Mrs Bird who is retiring at the end of term. She has given long service to Stewards as a Head of Year and teacher of Food Technology. She is an exceptionally accomplished cook and for many years has produced exquisite dishes as Stewards has hosted meetings and evening events. We wish her a long and very happy retirement.

## **Commonwealth Day Observance**

#### YELLOW EARTH THEATRE VISITS STEWARDS ACADEMY – FEBRUARY 2013

On Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> and Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> February, the Yellow Earth Theatre group visited Stewards Academy to work with all our Year 8 pupils to help them celebrate Chinese New Year. The Yellow Earth Theatre is a London based company that specialise in promoting Chinese culture in schools and community based projects. Over two days, the Yellow Earth Theatre introduced our Year 8 pupils to traditional shadow puppet theatre which is a popular form of traditional theatre originating in China.

Working in tutor groups, our pupils enjoyed a one hour workshop working with four specialist Chinese artists, including a Chinese musician. The workshops started with an introduction to the background of puppet theatre in China, which goes back many hundreds of years. The workshops then moved on to the telling of the traditional story of the animals of the Chinese zodiac. The story followed how the the Jade Emperor decided there should be a way of measuring time. On his birthday he told the animals that there was to be a swimming race. The first twelve animals across the fast flowing river would be the winners and they would each have a year of the zodiac named after them.

After the story, our pupils received a brief demonstration on how to make shadow puppets and then had 30 minutes working in groups to use their imaginative and creative skills to make shadow puppets based upon animals in the Chinese zodiac to help tell the story of how the Jade Emperor made his choices.

Once completed, pupils gave a demonstration of their puppets to the rest of the class and they participated in the telling of the Chinese zodiac. Pupils greatly enjoyed the workshops and showed impressive enthusiasm and commitment to making the workshops a memorable days for all involved. Pupil comment included "I really enjoyed making something that I had never heard of" and another pupil commented "I liked drawing and making our own puppets, the puppet show was really good!"

Our trip started with a coach journey down to Dartmoor on a cold and bright Saturday morning. Upon arrival at Okehampton Army base, we were greeted by the Essex Army Cadet Force staff (made up of former and current active soldiers) in full uniform. We were soon organised into our teams for the week then marched off to get our uniform issued (Including full camouflage gear, waterproofs and shiny black boots!) It was a valuable experience because it gave me a better understanding of the course I chose – which was childcare.* 

We were hard at work from 9.30 `til 12.00. We first had to draw a self portrait to show how we saw ourselves. We then went on to planning a child's lesson (and went on to present these at the end of the session). It was a mix of theory and practical work which really helped me to explore the course. It was very enjoyable and taught me the key skills I would need for that course.

There were a variety of courses you could choose from: childcare, engineering, hairdressing, bricklaying, plumbing, motor vehicle engineering and electrical installation.

I would definitely recommend that everyone give it a try because it was an amazing experience. It was work, learning, support and fun all in one."

### UKMT INTERMEDIATE MATHS CHALLENGE

The UK Maths Challenge is a nationwide competition where students between the ages of 13 and 16 sit a very tough maths test with problems set by some of the leading maths brains in the country. The top 40% of pupils nationwide receive certificates: a Gold certificate is awarded to the top 6 - 7% of all

Reading tests are currently underway for all Year 7 and 8 pupils and will be completed by the Easter break. The results of these computer based tests, which take about 10 minutes, will enable us to determine the progress that has been made over the term and to advise each pupil on the course of action which will most benefit their reading.

- The three main steps for getting the most from the Renaissance reading scheme are:
- Select a book in the middle of your range

- Read the book and take the quiz
- Look at the results of the quiz and

Choose a higher level book from within your range if you score above 85%

Choose a lower level book from within your range if you score below 85%

By following this process, reading will be aligned with the individual pupil's ability so that when we come to test again at the end of the summer term, tangible improvements should have been made.

So far there have been nearly 1,300 quizzes taken with well over 31 million words read! Keep reading!

# New York Trip

#### NEW YORK 2013

For the 12<sup>th</sup> consecutive year Stewards Academy have made a transatlantic trip. Eleven of them to the Big Apple. People ask me if I am bored of the same trip, the answer is definitely a very large "No!" The experience of taking pupils each year and seeing the excitement and wonderment on their faces is second to none and Mrs Hampstead was just as excited if not even more so! She had a massive beam on her face all the time, identifying scenes from films and the TV series "Suits". I award Mrs Hampstead with the "Most grateful member of staff ever taken" Award.

The current Year 11 were a delight to take, and will be forever remembered as the group who definitely shopped until they dropped. They did not waste a moment of their time in New York being ready to start the day at 8am and returning to the hotel for bed. As the years have gone by, I and the incredible



Mr Harman have squeezed even more into the schedule. I am confident that we visit, shop and admire more of New York in 4 days than most visitors accomplish in a week or more. We exceeded the target of blisters on blisters, having too many bags to carry and taking lots of photographs of lots of buildings. The smiles and excitement continued through the pain of walking miles on the streets of Manhattan, even Mr Naunton who has ran every day for the past 20 years cut down on his daily running distance! I did join him one morning – from the lift to my room!

Rather than a chronological recall of our schedule I will summarise. It started with a rather frightening incident on the way to the airport where ice fell from a lorry in front of the coach and smashed our windscreen. Huge compliments to our driver who managed to remain calm and safely get us to Heathrow on time! Being on time is one of my main priorities of life, and compliments to most of the pupils for most of the time, who all managed to meet my expectations. There were a couple of incidents where my time rule was not met, to quote Mr Harman *"I knew they had been found"* relating to 2 pupils who were late in Heathrow airport – he and the rest of terminal 5 heard my displeasure, the pupils were never late again. The rest of the trip passed without any further incident, even though Patrick McGovern was stopped both ways through customs, one for having an aerosol in his hand luggage on the way out, and then for traces of explosives on the way back! I'm pleased to say that he was eventually let go and no threat to any national security was ensued.



The tourist locations visited were the Statue of Liberty viewed from the Staten Island Ferry (by far the cheapest and best way to see it), as usual the pupils were not impressed with the forged image given by the USA of this iconic statue, where it seems to be exaggerated in size and moved to just in front of Manhattan. It is guite small and a long way out into the bay, but the Manhattan Island view with East River and Hudson River either side is definitely one not to be missed. The Memorial for 9/11 was very emotional for myself, having seen the Twin Towers on our first ever visit and then over the last 10 years to see the tributes to the victims move from the fences to the church and to the now permanent memorial. There are two footprints marking the original site of the Twin Towers with 30 foot waterfalls cascading into pools and then into a final central void. The names of all victims from that dreadful day in September 2001 are marked around the edge. The site is extremely tasteful and respectful.

The pupils were moved and considering most of them were only little when this happened were well informed of the tragic event. Then onto Brooklyn Bridge which has fantastic views down the East River and on to Brooklyn. It is an arduous walk up but much easier on the way down. At the bottom Street Performers awaited us, with Geena Manzi becoming part of the act – I must admit I hadn't filled in a risk assessment form for being jumped over by a tumbling street performer. However all was fine! My other favourite part of Manhattan is when we walk the disused railway from 12<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> Street which has

been made into a walkway. The pupils are always a bit apprehensive about this activity (Miss there is shopping to do!), but they admitted it was a delightful stroll above the noise and bustle of Manhattan, seeing views that can't be observed from anywhere else. Other visits included the Empire State Building, the intention was to do it at night, but this group were still shopping until 10.30pm and we couldn't really face another activity lasting until 1am, so we got up early to do it the next morning. Other activities were Ice Skating in Central Park, Strawberry Fields, the Zoo and the Natural History Museum. Now we get to the subject of shopping – this group took every opportunity available. After lunch we all had plenty of time to look around the technology and science based stands and to attend various shows demonstrating how much fun science can be. Judging by the wide eyes when we met up to come back, a good time was had by all.

**Isaac Lucia, 9NF said:** "The day provided a sweeping insight into the practical applications of science in careers and industry : from GM tomatoes to double decker buses and from curing diseases to fuelling the future. Helping Shell and engaging with families proved enjoyable and enriching, while having the chance to see people speak with such evident passion about their science-related jobs was certainly a treat." **Callum Smith, 8JS said:** "I found this trip really fun. I built a balloon buggy, ran a stall on my own, extracted DNA from a blueberry, made a jumping bean, a fan and an aeroplane (x2). I would recommend it. I also did exercise."

#### **COMMUNITY JUPITER WATCH**

#### PRESENTED BY ANDY GANNON AND ALLAN BELL, LOCAL ASTRONOMERS

Once again the sky was cloudy so we couldn't get the telescopes out and view Jupiter and its moons but we had a great time anyway because Andy and Allan's talks were very interesting.

Andy Gannon talked about the weather on Jupiter. Jupiter is a huge ball of gas, over 300 times bigger than the Earth, but it rotates every 10 hours. This very fast rotation causes the gases to churn producing magnificent storms like the Great Red Spot (GRS), twice the diameter of the Earth, which has been raging now for at least 180 years. Bands of different coloured gases are also seen indicating clouds at different levels with mini storms, about 2000 km across, popping up and travelling along the band. Jupiter has a huge magnetic field. Scientists believe that at Jupiter's core there is a ball of liquid Hydrogen which acts like a metal. The swirling of this metal produces the magnetic field which protects the planet from the solar wind and flares. At the poles magnificent auroras are seen, produced by the solar wind interacting with the magnetic field, just like on Earth.

Allan Bell talked about the many moons orbiting Jupiter. At the moment we think there are 67 moons going around Jupiter. The four largest moons were first discovered by Galileo in 1610 using a telescope. He named them Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto so they are collectively called the Galilean moons. Io, Jupiter's closest moon, is a large, rocky, volcanically active moon spewing out molten sulphur. Next is Europa, a large, dense, icy moon with a very smooth surface. Then comes Ganymede, the largest of Jupiter's moon, an icy moon scarred with impact craters and finally Callisto another large, icy low density moon covered in impact craters. Jupiter also has many much smaller moons. Scientists think that some of them were originally asteroids caught by Jupiter's gravitational pull which have since disintegrated into smaller chunks.

**Brendan Chitty 7TS** : 'I really enjoyed the talk because it was well explained and was very interesting. I have learnt a lot and really enjoyed the PowerPoint that was shown. I will keep on coming to these talks. I will take this information with me as it is good and will hopefully help me pass my GCSEs.'

**Jamie Allen 70K :** 'I really enjoyed the talk about Jupiter. It was very interesting and I learnt a lot about Europa as well. I learnt that Jupiter spins faster than any of the other planets, at a shocking 9.9 hours/ revolution. It was a good PowerPoint as well and I will keep on going to these talks'.

Wildlife Trust set to with secateurs and rakes and cleared away lots of bramble that was taking over the wood.











# Important Information

#### TRAVEL ABROAD

Whilst at Stewards your child has various opportunities to travel abroad - from residential trips within the European Union, North America and Asia - to day trips. Opportunities may be open in future academic years to go even further afield! So as you and your child are well prepared for these exciting trips the Academy advises parents to obtain for their child their own passport and if travelling to an EU country, a European Health Insurance Card [EHIC]; this ensures that should your child require medical attention abroad, treatment will be at a reduced cost or free.

#### <u>Passport</u>

The Academy would advise parents/carers to obtain for their child, a 5-year laminated UK passport. Passport forms can be obtained from your local Post Office. For further information about child passports visit <u>www.passport.gov.uk</u> or telephone the Passport Advice Line on 0870 521 0410. Be aware that some countries ask for passports to have at least 6 months validity from date of departure or visa application. Passports can be renewed no more than 9 months prior to expiry date.

#### European Health Insurance Card [EHIC]

From 1<sup>st</sup> January 2006, a valid EHIC card should be obtained and carried by each pupil whilst travelling in the European Union (EU). If you are a UK resident, you are entitled to medical treatment that becomes necessary, at reduced cost or sometimes free, when temporarily visiting a EU country, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway or Switzerland. Only treatment provided under the state scheme is covered. However, to obtain treatment you will need to take a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) with you. To apply for your child you will need their NHS number plus full name, address and date of birth. The card is free and is now a plastic 'credit card' type. This card is easily obtainable by phone (EHIC Applications Line 0300 330 1350), via the web site <u>www.ehic.org.uk</u> or by post (pick up an EHIC application pack from your local Post Office branch).

School travel companies require passport numbers, dates of issue and expiry, etc, well before departure. Delays in obtaining the above documents may mean your child will miss out on exciting and interesting trips. So don't delay – make sure your child has their own passport or renew their passport well before expiry and has their own EHIC Card.

#### IMPORTANT POINTS TO REMEMBER:

To qualify for a school trip attendance and punctuality will be considered and is at the discretion of the staff involved.

For your child to continue to qualify for school trips, they must have and continue to have good attendance, punctuality, behaviour and attitude towards school.

If you withdraw your child from a school trip you will not be entitled to any refund unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Should you fail to keep to the payment schedule for residential trips, your child's place on the trip will be in jeopardy.

<u>PUPIL LUNCH OVERDRAFTS - A reminder to all parents/guardians</u> - Please ensure your child comes to school with either a packed lunch or has enough money in their cashless catering account to buy lunch. Pupils who have genuinely lost or forgotten their lunch money can come to the Academy's Finance Office to ask for a £1.00 overdraft on their cashless catering account. Pupils must ensure they repay the £1.00 into their account when next they return to school. Persistent non-payers will not be allowed further overdrafts if money is still owed.

Please would parents/guardians be aware that lunch overdrafts are for *EMERGENCIES ONLY*, and are not to be used as a means for your child to buy 'extras' at break or lunch time.
