BUILDING A BUG HOTEL AND LIVING WILLOW BIRD HIDE

Stewards can hold it's first Ugly Bug Ball now that Stewards Conservation Group built a bug hotel in the meadow. The hotel was made from old broken pallets that were repaired, and piled up one on top of the other. Each layer has different bug habitats, leaf litter, rotting branches, bamboo rods, chicken wire etc. so that it can accommodate all sorts of bugs. Amphibians like frogs and toads will also make their home there because at the bottom layer of the hotel there are partially covered areas that will stay cool and damp throughout the summer. Animals like hedgehogs and mice may also overwinter in the hotel.

We also built a living willow bird hide. The site was chosen so that we can

observe the birds feeding at the food station decorating the oak tree in the middle of the meadow. The willow whips were bought in as a kit which

made it quite easy to put together. First the site was prepared; weed prevention matting was pegged down then the willow whips were planted and woven to make a screen. This will, over the summer, come out in leaf and new branches will grow. During the autumn grass cutting and general tidying up session these new branches will be trimmed and woven into the structure. Hopefully the screen will be thick enough to use when we take part in the Big School Bird Watch in January 2013.

As the sky was overcast, we were not able to go out and view Jupiter so we stayed indoors and designed and made model planetary landers with marshmallow astronauts.

ENGINEERING OUR FUTURE IN DEFENCE

Presented by Chelmsford Science and Engineering Society and ExploreSTEM

Anglia Ruskin University (ARU), Chelmsford. Stewards upper school students went to the ARU to find out about the local defence engineering companies in Essex, what they do and what qualifications are required to work there. The students listened to several short talks introducing the local industries and the career paths the presenters took to obtain their position. Each industry had an exhibition with interactive elements to entice the students which also enabled the students to chat to the graduates in each industry. There were representatives from E2V, Finmeccanica, BAE Systems, Selex Galileo, the Royal Navy and Selex ELSAG, all local Essex industries. 'NUCLEAR POWER STATIONS: PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE' TALK

He talked about the pros and cons of nuclear power, The accidents at Chernobyl and Fukushima were discussed and the future of nuclear power stations in the UK.

THE IET FARADAY ENGINEERING CHALLENGE DAY

Great fun was had by all at the Institute of Engineering and Technology Faraday Engineering Challenge Day hosted by Stewards Academy. Teams of six Year 8 students who are gifted and talented in Science, Maths or Technology from six schools across the region competed against each other to design a drink dispensing machine for use during the Olympics Race-walking event. The challenge was to design and build a prototype drink dispenser which would deliver a certain volume of drink in a cup, which was then moved towards the race-walker to ease collection as they passed the hydration station. Students from Stewards, Passmores, St Marks, Davenant, Westcliff High School for Boys and Herts and Essex High School for Girls competed in this all day challenge. The staff from each of the schools also took part and designed their own drink dispenser.

The winning team came from Herts and Essex High School for Girls; although they drew on points with the team who came second they spent the least amount of money on materials. The second team came from Westcliff High School for Boys and one of the teams from Stewards came third. The winning team received a glass trophy and a goody bag.

Lewis Wait from Davenant said: *"It really got me thinking outside the box and my design and technology skills were stretched".* Reece Carter from Westcliff said: *"I learnt a lot about team building and the experience changed my views about pursuing an engineering career in a positive way".*

ISAAC NEWTON AND THE BIRTH OF THE SCIENTIFIC METHOD

Presented by Stuart Clark, Astronomy Journalist. Recently, Miss Shute and I had the pleasure of accompanying fourteen students to Mr Stuart Clark's presentation of *Isaac Newton and the Birth of the Scientific Method*. As we study science in secondary





International Dimension News Chinese art workshops in stewards academy

On Monday 6th February 2012, two Chinese artists were invited into Stewards Academy to work with Year 7 pupils; their names were Mr Riujin Hu and Mr Le Guo. Communications from the Academy – PARENT-MAIL

In previous Newsletters I have published information about the new system of communication with parents and carers. Forms have been sent home asking families to send in their mobile phone numbers for TEXT messages, and eMAIL ADDRESSES so that we can email urgent information to you. It was a slow response and after many months we still have a number of families who have not returned their form.

We are in the final stages of implementing this great new system which has many advantages. If your child is out on a trip and there is a delay, you can be notified immediately. Likewise if your child has an accident or becomes unwell during the day. Many printed letters are sent home via pupils, but they do not always get passed on, and vital information may be missed by parents and carers. In addition, in due course we hope to establish ParentPay so that you can make direct payments for trips and school lunches, which is much safer than pupils carrying money around with them. As this is to be the method of communicating all Academy information to families, we are anxious to reach those people who have not yet responded. Very well done to Years 7 and 8 who between them have an over 90% response rate.

Staff will be trying to make telephone contact with those families who have not so far returned their form as we need to have everyone included in this system, unless you specifically say you do not wish to participate. Thank you in advance for your co-operation.
