## THE BNA BLAKE SHIELD COMPETITION

Presentation of Awards Day Clifton College, Clifton, Bristol November 2011
Over the past 4 years Stewards Conservation Group and Harlow Conservation Volunteers have been involved in the conservation of Stewards Ancient Meadow. This work was recorded by the students as a project and then submitted to the British Naturalists Trust (BNA) so that it could compete in the Blake Shield Competition. In the past the Presentation of Awards day has been staged at Leicester University but 2011 was their 25th Anniversary so they decided to go to Clifton College, a collection of beautiful old red brick buildings near Bristol instead. Our day started very early; we saw the sun rise while we were travelling along the M25. We arrived at the Redgrave Theatre at Clifton College a little before 10am and took part in an interactive talk about rainforests. We were treated to a lovely lunch at Clifton Colleges' main refectory, the inside of which was reminiscent of Hogwarts dining hall, with stained glass windows and a vaulted ceiling. In the afternoon we had a stroll around Bristol Zoo before heading back to see who had won the various prizes. The awards were presented by Professor David Bellamy, the Patron of the Blake Shield BNA Trust.
3 main awards were presented :
The Otter Award for an Infant School children's project,
The Ward Cup for a Junior School children's project
The Blake Shield for 11 to 16 year old students. We were very pleased when

Stewards Conservation group took part in the RSPB Big School Bird Watch at the weekend. We came armed with camouflage netting and binoculars and watched three different areas of the meadow: Group 1 watched by the pond area, Group 2 by the apple trees and Group 3 by the junior Oak tree and the Dogwood.
We saw several species of bird over the 60 minute watch time; the results are displayed in the table.
Black-headed Gulls were the most abundant species seen followed by Starlings and Carrion Crows. These birds are all scavengers, on the lookout for any dead creatures or fallen fruit. We could hear a lot of House Sparrows in the Blackthorn thicket but we had difficulty seeing them and therefore counting them.
Although it was very cold, about $3{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$, we all had a great bird watching experience and between us we saw a lot of different birds. Stewards Bird Watchers:

## BBC STARGAZING LIVE: COMMUNITY VENUS WATCH

Stewards Academy January 2012
Hoards of people turned up for the Community Venus Watch in Lab7. They all came to listen to Mr A Gannon talk about Venus, its composition, its atmosphere and its orbit around the Sun. We found out that Venus is a rocky planet with a thick corrosive atmosphere the pressure of which is about 90 times that on Earth. The surface temperature of Venus is about $480^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$, far too hot for life as we know it. Scientists think that Venus was like Earth with lots of surface water many millions of years ago but the surface temperature rose too much due to 1) its position closer to the Sun and 2) the runaway greenhouse effect of its atmosphere and the water evaporated away into space. At the moment Venus can be seen very early in the evening as the sun sets about $45^{\circ}$ above the horizon in the south west. It is the brightest object in the sky except the Moon and by about 7.30 pm it has sunk beneath the horizon. The other bright object higher up in the sky in the south is Jupiter.
Unfortunately the sky was cloudy so we couldn't get the telescopes out to view Venus but Mr Young provided a very good interactive creative activity: making blow rockets. Great fun was had by all.
Mr M Gladish and Charlie (William Martin Primary School) found the evening 'very interesting and we learnt a lot tonight. Charlie loved making the rocket.'


## ‘THE MYSTERY OF COSMIC RAYS’: AN EVENING INSTITUTE OF PHYSICS LECTURE

Presented by Professor Alan Michette, Kings College London University of Hertfordshire, Hatfield Cosmic rays, travelling at a speed comparable to the speed of light, come from the Sun, the Galaxy and the Universe. They consist mainly of protons, but can consist of alpha particles and other atomic nuclei. More than 100,000 cosmic ray particles can pass through you in a hour and each of them could damage your DNA. Professor Michette is hoping to obtain funding so that cosmic ray detectors can be installed in at least a thousand schools country wide. The data obtained will be collated and used to find out more about this strange radiation.

# Important Information 

## TRAVEL ABROAD

Whilst at Stewards your child has various opportunities to travel abroad - from residential trips within the European Union, North America and Asia - to day trips. Opportunities may be open in future academic years to go even further afield! So as you and your child are well prepared for these exciting trips the school advises parents to obtain for their child their own passport and if travelling to an EU country, a European Health Insurance Card [EHIC]; this ensures that should your child require medical attention abroad, your child should not incur medical fees.

## Passport

The school would advise parents/carers to obtain for their child, a 5-year laminated UK passport. Passport forms can be obtained from your local Post Office. For further information about child passports visit www.passport.gov.uk or telephone the Passport Advice Line on 0870 521 0410. Be aware that some countries ask for passports to have at least 6 months validity from date of departure or visa application. Passports can be renewed no more than 9 months prior to expiry date.

## European Health Insurance Card [EHIC]

From $1^{\text {st }}$ January 2006, a valid EHIC card should be obtained and carried by each pupil whilst travelling in the European Union (EU). If you are a UK resident, you are entitled to medical treatment that becomes necessary, at reduced cost or sometimes free, when temporarily visiting an EU country, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway or Switzerland. Only treatment provided under the state scheme is covered. However, to obtain treatment you will need to take a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) with you. To apply for your child you will need their NHS number plus full name, address and date of birth. The card is free and is now a plastic 'credit card' type. This card is easily obtainable by phone (EHIC Applications Line 0845606 2030), via the web site www.ehic.org.uk or by post (pick up an EHIC application pack from your local Post Office branch).
School travel companies require passport numbers, dates of issue and expiry, etc, well before departure. Delays in obtaining the above documents may mean your child will miss out on exciting and interesting trips. So don't delay make sure your child has their own passport or renew their passport well before expiry.

Pupils must ensure they repay the $£ 1.00$ into their catering account on the next working day. Persistent non-payers will not be allowed further overdrafts if money is still owed.
Please would parents/guardians be aware that lunch overdrafts are for EMERGENCIES ONLY, and are not to be used as a means for your child to buy 'extras' at lunch time or break time.

He showed parts of this novel to Jennifer Luithlen, an agent based in Leicester, and she agreed to take him on. The publisher loved the story and offered Bali a contract. The Crew and then Rani \& Sukh followed the first novel which were both well received and widely read. Bali is now an established voice in the young adult/ teenage market. He also spends a large part of his year doing events, promotions and creative writing classes.
