Science News

RADAR: THEORY, PRACTICE, HISTORY, FUTURE AND PROBLEMS. PRESENTED DR. COLIN WRIGHT.

On 6th October 2010, students from Stewards School, went to the University of Hertfordshire to hear a lecture on RADAR: Theory, Practice, History, Future and Problems. RADAR was first invented in 1935 by Watson-Watt and is still in use today. It played a decisive role in the Battle of Britain during World War II. Hitler decided to invade Britain so he sent 2000 Luftwaffe bombers to destroy our aircraft; he would then have control of the sky above the channel and his invasion fleet would be safe from British attack.

Luckily we had RADAR. It was physically able to detect the enemy bombers 30 minutes before they arrived, giving our fighter planes time to scramble and be ready for the bombers when they arrived. Since then RADAR has advanced: the range has increased, and the readings are a lot more accurate. Not all readings from RADAR are accurate though. It seems that you can get shadowing, where objects hide behind other objects and mirroring, where the signals are bounced between objects creating another object which isn't really there!

PHYSICS AT WORK EXHIBITION 2010

CAVENDISH LABORATORIES, UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE 22ND SEPTEMBER 2010

A group of Young, Gifted and Talented Year 9 and a few Year 8 and 10 students went to the Cavendish Laboratories, part of the University of Cambridge, to see an exhibition which showcases the many uses of physics in everyday life, along with applications of physics in research and industry. Each of the exhibits were presented by people working at the cutting-edge of research and development.

The photograph shows the students listening to a PhD student talk about nanoscience: the science behind

engineering at a very small scale. This term can be applied to many areas of research and development: from computing, electronics and medicine, to cosmetics and even to fashion. Nanotechnology offers the potential to create cheaper, lighter and faster devices that can do more, use fewer raw materials and consume less energy. A good example of this is the mobile phone; it has changed dramatically in a few years, becoming smaller and smaller yet gaining more functions, getting faster and cheaper! The Students listened to six lectures in all, many of them having hands-on interactive activities that they could take part in.




And finally ...



Peer Mentor News

Last year Stewards introduced a new initiative of having Peer Mentors for some Year 7's, to help them with the transition from primary into secondary education. This has continued this year with a new group of Year 10's mentoring the new Year 7's. The Year 10 students underwent a very rigorous selection process followed by two and a half days training which will lead to a gualification. Seven Year 9 pupils have just been chosen to be the next set of peer mentors

Aimhigher Summer School

During the summer I had the opportunity to attend a summer school at Anglia Ruskin University in Chelmsford. Over the duration of the summer school I learnt that there are many different job opportunities within the health care profession. We focused on four of these professions and they were; child nursing, adult nursing, mental health nursing and midwifery. When learning about these professions I realised that there is much more contained within the jobs, and that the disciplines required for each nursing area are unique. We visited a local hospital and was able to observe the roles of different health professionals at work, which was a really valuable experience.

In the evenings there was a varied range of activities organised for us, including bowling, quizzes and a trip to the cinema, we had a real taste of life on campus as an undergraduate student. I studied Health and Social Care for two years at Stewards and achieved a Distinction Star Grade, but had always maintained that I wanted to be a primary school teacher and until the point of attending the summer school, that was my aim. However, after 3 days at Anglia Ruskin my mind and heart were set on becoming a nurse. I therefore changed direction with my choice at further education, I am now studying Level 3 Health and Social Care at Harlow College.

My whole experience at Anglia Ruskin University was brilliant and my advice to all students who get the opportunity to attend a summer school is 'grab the chance and enjoy the experience, you will have an amazing and memorable time'.
