School Uniform

Students are expected to be in complete school uniform. For this half term only, **blazers must be brought to school and worn as they enter the building**, but pupils are then permitted to not wear them throughout the day as the weather gets warmer. Ties must be always worn, correct school shoes (no trainers), black v neck jumpers (without logos) and skirts at knee level. Recently there has been a fashion trend to wear more than one pair of socks differing in colour please ensure just one pair of either white or black not both together. Hoodies should not be worn in or around school. Lanyards must also be worn all the time and PE kit must be worn to PE lessons. We want students to feel proud to be part of Stewards Academy and wearing our uniform correctly is a huge part of the culture of the school.

Pupils are required to not only wear their lanyard with identification card always attached on entry to school but during the school day. By wearing their identification card always allows staff at a glance to ensure pupils have access to food in the canteens and use of the printers and photocopiers. For safeguarding reasons it also allows us to ensure the pupils are members of our school community.

Please ensure that hair is of a natural looking colour only, no jewellery should be worn; this includes bracelets, necklaces, rings and nose piercings, watches may be worn, however, smart watches are not allowed. One pair of stud earrings are permitted. Pupils will be asked to remove them or confiscation of these items will happen. This is to ensure the safety of pupils as jewellery can often catch on things leading to injury.

The school cannot accept responsibility of things lost at school so we would like these valuable and sentimental items left at home. False nails, painted nails and false eyelashes must be removed before school and are not allowed. Uniform gate will be running as usual and normal protocols will apply. Pupils that arrive late, after 8.40am, will be directed to Uniform Gate in the usual way. Pupils that arrive later will still be asked to remain in Student Services if not in uniform, a member of staff will be called to address the uniform issue. It may be necessary to park the pupil in the Green Room until uniform can be sorted.

Pupils may also be turned around at the school gate before they enter school to go home and change. We do hold a selection of spare clean uniforms, including shoes, which will be offered to students in the first place. Should you have any issues regarding the purchase of a school uniform, please contact your PSM.

Mobile Phones

For whatever reason, we have seen an influx in the number of phones that are being confiscated. We are currently looking into secure storage facilities so that phones can be locked away during the day; depending on cost and logistics we are hoping to get this in place for September. The government are backing the ban of mobile phones in school; their guidance was released on 19th February, and although we have a system in place which is compliant with this guidance, the fact that young people are still using them says that we need to do more. Mobile phones are currently still allowed to be with the pupil; however the use of them is not permitted during the school day for any reason. This is for safeguarding purposes as you have seen recently in the news. (This is not a new rule for Stewards pupils) Pupils can ask PSM's to use a phone in their office in an emergency. Parents are reminded please don't call the pupils, that they can contact school to pass on any important information to pupils. Phones seen will be confiscated and a prep issued for that evening. Tutors will be awarding positive points on the Stewards Passport to all pupils that meet these standards both at morning prep and tutor check in. This will give all pupils an incredible boost to their passport journey to rewards.

Room 21

Following on from our successful introduction of room 21, which has been created to help support many of the pupils with daily struggles of emotions or high anxiety, over this term we will be phasing out our old Time out passes. If you are concerned by this, please contact your year lead to discuss.

Year 11

As we prepare for our year 11 leaving us we are aware they may no longer have need for their uniform and PE kits. If you would like we would happily accept donations of clean usable uniform and PE kit. Please hand into reception.

Your support is greatly appreciated in these matters, we look forward to supporting our young people in a successful year at Stewards Academy.

This is an annual challenge which Stewards has participated in for many years, and once again the pupils have done us incredibly proud. This challenge is extremely difficult as students must apply excellent mathematical thinking in order to find the solutions.

Special mentions go to Zack Van Der Merwe who achieved the 'Best in Year' award and Daisy O'Dell who achieved 'Best in School'. Due to Daisy's extraordinary performance, she has qualified for the follow-on round and will soon compete in the Pink Kangaroo challenge. Congratulations Daisy, this is a huge achievement and you have done Stewards proud!

Next up is the Junior challenge for Years 7 & 8. We will keep you updated on how they get on and hopefully more award news to follow.

Our pupils showed great resilience throughout the challenge which is reflected in the fantastic results. Well done everyone!

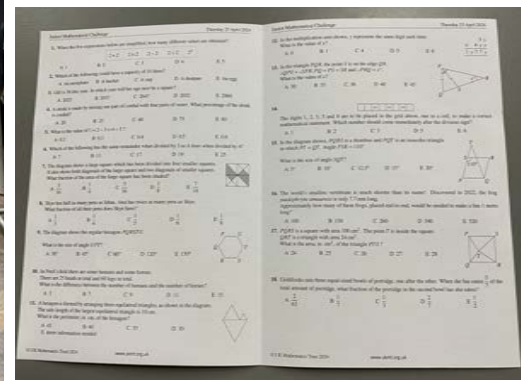
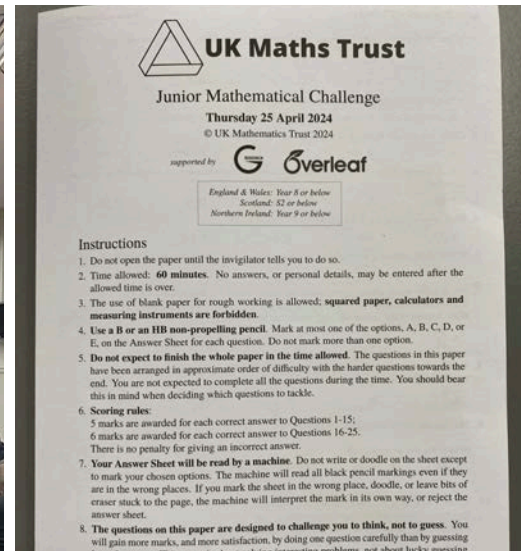

UKMT Junior Maths Challenge



The UKMT Junior Maths Challenge is a 60 minute, 25 multiple choice Challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency to make students think. The problems on the Junior Maths Challenge are accessible yet still challenge those with more experience.

Reading Matters

When I was at school, the choice of fiction reading material was basically Enid Blyton's Famous Five and Secret Seven stories or Roald Dahl and his tales of James and the Giant Peach, The BFG, and Matilda to name but a few.

The story (excuse the pun!) is very different for our Key-Stage three pupils today. With such a huge choice of published books and a well-stocked school library, there really is no excuse for not choosing to read, after all it's not as if you can only choose Enid Blyton or Roald Dahl.

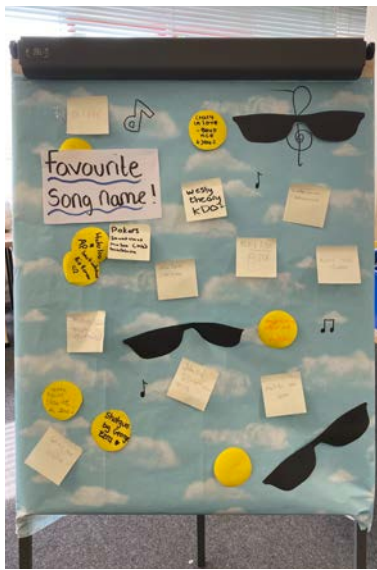
Our Library

Stewards Academy pupils were privileged to attend the Delfont Mackintosh Les Miserables education performance on Tuesday 14th May.

Thirty students accompanied by three staff travelled to London to watch the show and technical demonstration.

The students behaviour was impeccable as they joined hundreds of others in the theatre. Allocated seats in the front stalls they enjoyed a prime position for this incredible production.

The Drug Bus Visits Stewards

The drugs bus is an exciting and unique Platform that allows students to learn about various topics in a fun and engaging way. There are 2 main areas on the bus: upstairs is Maddie's crack shack. This area is dark and dingy and designed to represent a drugs den. This is our discussion space where we can tailor our information to discuss various topics such as SUBSTANCE MISUSE, KNIFE CRIME, COUNTY LINES, MENTAL HEALTH and OFFENDING. People will take part in activities that revolve around these different topics, such as what substances are and how they affect you, consequences, and choices, what is county lines, dealing with substance misuse situations, offending and what a life in prison would be like. In the "crack shack", they will not just discuss the issues but be fully immersed into the environment. The second area is our replica prison cells. People will be put into the cells and have to take part in a 10-minute cell escape activity where they will have to solve puzzles and clues relating to substance misuse to get themselves released early on good behaviour. There are some hard-hitting learning points that the people will pick up whilst working through these activities which will challenge their opinions, thoughts, and views.

Year 8 - I really enjoyed it. I didn't think about the link between drug and knife crime, but will be more aware now.

Year 7 - It was good, the prison cell was so small and the lady said sometimes you wouldn't even get a window. I can't imagine not having a window to look out of.

Year 8 - I see people out on the street and you think they may be doing drugs, but I never thought about them carrying a knife. It made me think.

Year 9 - The drug den was scary, drugs just mess up your life. I hope none of my friends get involved. I would be so worried for them.

Staff - It was really interesting and I learnt so much. I wanted to share my drug bus experience feedback as I honestly feel the way it was shown was so hard hitting. I was first in the prison cell, and it was dark and stuffy and smelt. It wasn't nice, needing to find things in the dark, writings on the wall shown only by one small torch and needing to be close to the toilet. I was aware it was not prison for myself, but it was so well done I could not imagine being in there for any longer than I had too. This was also shown by the students in with me as it went from 'yeah I could stay in here' to not being able to stay still, becoming very hot and wanting to leave. The lady talking was so factual and real it was incredible. We then went upstairs and to see a 'drug den' was hard hitting. I knew it was a doll lying on the dirty mattress surrounded by drugs and sick and rubbish but where it looked so real I felt physically sick to realise this could be someone we know. The information with knife crime was so insightful and has really made me think about the extra challenges our students face once they leave this school and how dangerous a walk home can really be. I found the thinking about what they could do to help keep themselves safe was amazing and I saw the students start to think about what is best for them to survive.

UKROC International Youth Rocketry Competition

UKROC is a youth rocketry competition that attracts teams from the UK, USA, France and Japan to compete for the prize. Last year's final was in Paris, this year it was Farnborough's turn to host at it's UK airshow. Winning teams from Scotland, Northern Ireland, North of England, South-west and South-east compete in regionals to find the UK's entry.

Our Rocket Club mission was set in motion before the end of term last academic year. Since many of the components are sourced from the USA we ordered up well in advance for this year's competition. Our Mission brief was to design and build a model rocket that could reach 250m in height, deploy a parachute and return to the ground with a total flight time of 43-46 seconds, and keep it's payload of a raw hen's egg intact.

Over the months of September and October we tested designs using a simulation program called Open Rocket to design and virtually test our designs. In November we started building our rocket using techniques and materials we had not used before such as composite epoxy, Kevlar and Nomex to make our rocket light, but very strong. We were struggling to keep weight down (every 5 grams costs 1metre to lost!) to reach the required 250m. We managed this in the end and produced a good looking model rocket.

The South-east regional date was set for 2nd May at Stowe Maries WW1 aerodrome. Only a disused airfield is big enough to safely launch these powerful models. We spent the days leading up to the competition with our eyes glued to the weather forecast, the force of winds, especially gusts seriously affects the flight. We didn't want a repeat of last year's flight which required us to jump streams, bushwhack our way through trees and hedges to get the rocket back 300m away from where it was launched.

On the day the winds were light and the rain held off. We launched but had a problem with the rocket and did not reach the required height. We problem-solved the issue and fixed the fault for a textbook second flight and finished the day in fourth place out of 32 teams. We will find out in the next few days if our score will be good enough to go through to the Nationals. Watch this space!

I want to thank all those who have contributed to this endeavour, including the Technology team who were amazing, but mainly to the fantastic pupils who gave so much time, thought and effort to the cause. In no particular order our thanks go to Jenson Baker and Alfie Bishop in Year 10 for their amazing building skills, Oliver Fearn, Merral Elhag and Samuel Nottingham in Year 8 for their endless energy and ideas (whilst learning the different roles). Finally Noah Jones in Year 9 for his technical skills with rocket motors and his brother Ethan Jones in Year 11 who finally bows out having given up so much time to Rocket Club. Thank you Ethan, we couldn't have done it without you.

Now we catch our breath and prepare for September when the next mission is revealed.

The last activity of the day was football with Lei, Dan and Nobel out on the pitch who all performed exceptionally well showing off their core and advanced skills in the football match at the end of the day which showcased their talents.

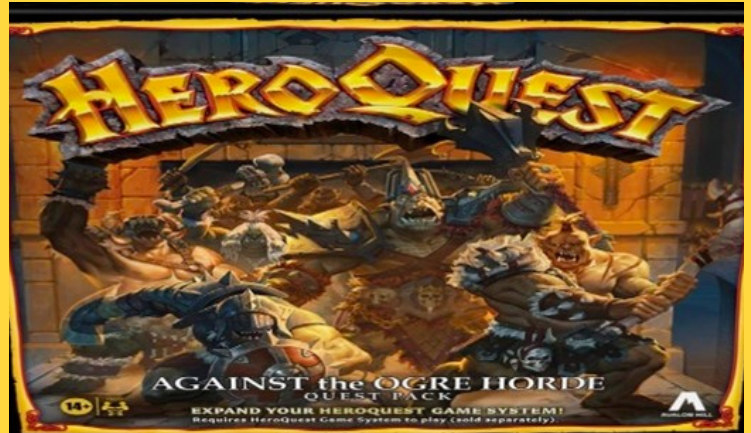

out.

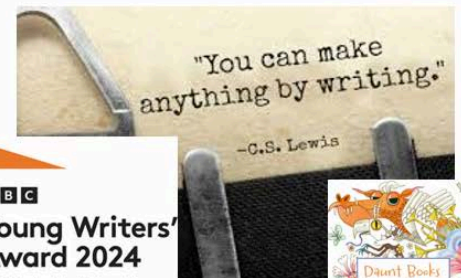
I come from down the rainbow road,

A Parent's Guide to Cyberbullying

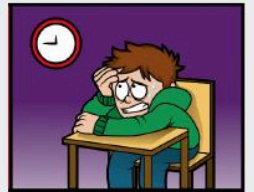


Many young people who are victims of cyberbullying suffer in silence.

Much of our focus this half term has been on the 'U' element of our COURAGE values, which is 'Unity'.

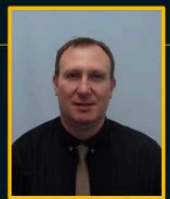

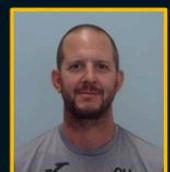
