Year 12 Physical Geography Summer Task

Your summer task is split into three tasks, aimed at practising some of the vital skills for Geography at A-Level, which will make up part of your year 12 studies.

- A) You will be studying the Holderness coastline as part of your coasts topic in year 12. Your first task is to produce an information sheet including some of the sections below:

The location

- Why is this coastline interesting for Geographers?
- General facts about the area
- How has the Holderness coastline changed over time?

In terms of presentation, you should use A3 or A4 paper and suitable diagrams and/or photos, as well as sub-headings for the key ideas above. A hand-drawn map of the area would be preferable. Work should always be elaborated, facts must be used, ideas should NOT be copied from the Internet, and any names of landforms, settlements and places of interest along the coastline should be used where appropriate.

- B) Your second task is to produce landform 'knowledge sheets' related to some of the coastal features in the Holderness area. This is a key skill as it is directly linked to the A-Level Physical Geography exam. You are going to complete 3 sheets in total, for the following landforms:

- A stack
- A bay
- A blowhole

This task should be presented on A4 or A5 paper. It must include hand drawn, labelled diagrams of the geographical features. The template below shows what I expect from this task:

- C) **Research Skills:** You are going to find and use sources of information from the internet to show how people can be negatively impacted by living along the Holderness coastline. This must go beyond what you have studied at GCSE level.

You should find and use evidence to show how living in this changing environment can be dangerous and how it can have implications for different groups of people. Produce a poster, written piece of work or information page. This can be completed by hand or electronically.

At the bottom of the page, leave some space to write down any websites and website links, newspaper articles or books that helped in your research. You may not use Wikipedia.
