Pupil Voice

Why apply?

Pupil Voice and positions of responsibility are a central and important part of academy life. Being a member of a Pupil Voice group, such as the School Council or Student Leadership Team enables you to have your views heard. You are representatives of your tutor group and year group and feed in information and opinions to the decision making process for key agenda items throughout the year. You also get to help lead, deliver and participate in a range of events.

Members of the School Council and Student Leadership Team meet regularly to discuss issues that affect students and are able to put their point of view to the Headteacher or to those in a position to bring about change. The introduction of school lockers, the new toilets, the picnic benches outside the dining room and the lockable bike storage area were the direct result of the work of the School Council. More recently School Council members have fed into the changes to the school day, 3 year KS3, use of mobile phones, the Stewdent Profile (Phoenix Challenge) and the new House System that will start in the new academic year.



Those with positions of responsibility are often called upon to represent the academy .They have proven to be wonderful ambassadors for the school on many occasions. Some examples are listed here:

- Taking part in the interviews for Senior members of staff
- Representing the students at Governors meetings
- Giving tours of the academy to prospective parents and teachers on interview
- Prefecting at academy events
- Talking to OFSTED inspectors during our inspection in March 2017 and the IQM inspector in 2019
- Organising charity events

We are now looking for next year's applicants for all positions of responsibility including the Year 11 Student Leadership Team, School Council, Prefects and Peer Mentors. A relevant announcement and application form is on ClassCharts for each year group. The deadline for applications has been extended until Monday 22nd June. All completed applications (please ensure it has your name and tutor group on) can be uploaded to ClassCharts or emailed to PupilVoice@stewardsacademy.org. You are also able to submit a photo of your application form if you are unable to attach the word document.

Once all applications have been received we will notify you of how we proceed to the next stage. For those applying for the positions of Head Boy, Head Girl or a member of Student Leadership Team this will involve an interview.

I hope you take the time to consider applying for a position of responsibility. It is a strange time to be considering such things but it is an incredibly important part of academy life. I asked some of the Year 11s who were part of the Student Leadership Team this year to explain why they thought it is beneficial and their responses are on the next page.

I have had the privilege of working with an amazing group of students this year and I hope that next year's team is just as special. I look forward to reading your applications.


I would like to share some of their efforts with you all in the newsletter this week.





House System

The House System is designed to embody the values and ethos of Stewards and be an integral part of our school community. On entering Stewards all pupils become members of a House and are expected to do their best for it in their work in lessons and in their commitment to extra-curricular activities.

The aim is to provide every pupil in each house with the following:

- An opportunity to demonstrate the elements of 'COURAGE'.
- A sense of belonging within the school community.
- Opportunities to develop social, intellectual, physical and practical skills.
- A sense of achievement both inside and outside of the classroom.
- Fun and excitement through competition.
- Opportunities for leadership.
- An awareness of individual and collective responsibility.

At Stewards we are very proud of all the pupils and look to celebrate their achievements throughout each term. All pupils have the opportunity to earn Positive Points for their house on a daily basis. These points will be awarded for completing an excellent piece of work; for spontaneous acts of kindness; for meeting a personal target; representing the school and many more. House points will be collated weekly to recognise successes and at the end of the academic year all points will be tallied up to establish the house winning the overall trophy.

HOUSE ORGANISATION

Each house is made up of 10 tutor groups which are overseen by a Head of House. Each member of staff is also attached to a house that they will remain with during their time at Stewards. Each house will have designated Year 11 House Captain and two School Council representatives per form class to support. These pupils will act as representatives for all the pupils in their house throughout the year by; helping co-ordinate house teams, organise activities and events and represent their house at relevant meetings.

There will be many house events throughout the year from all areas of school life. This blend ensures that everyone has the opportunity, pupils and staff alike, to represent their house in something that they enjoy, something they are good at or something that will challenge them outside their comfort zone.
