Head Boy/ Head Girl elections process



Twenty - two pupils applied for the prestigious positions of Head Boy and Head Girl this year. As part of their application each candidates ClassCharts record and attendance record (up until 20th March due to the partial closure) was reviewed.



The next stage of the process was for the candidates to participate in socially distanced group interviews. The interviews took place on Tuesday 30th June and Wednesday 1st July. The interview facilitator was Mrs da Vighi, the interviewer was Mrs Ramsey and the selection panel comprised of Mrs Sherwood- Assistant Headteacher, Mr King– Head of Humanities, Mr Hughes– Pastoral Lead and Mrs Coates—Year 10 PSM.

Voting

The vote will take place on Wednesday 15th July via a secure Microsoft form. The link will be sent out in advance but will go live on Wednesday morning at 8am and remain open until 5pm.

Everyone will have one vote for Head Boy and one vote for Head Girl.

Although it is useful to know who has voted, your vote will be anonymous.

The votes will be added up automatically.
