School Council and Year 7 Year Council

Thank you to the current members who have served this academic year. Still keeping busy even during the partial closure period I held two socially distanced sessions last week to discuss the **proposal for bringing all pupils back in September**. Mrs Ginger has written to your parents with key information and you will find answers to some of the questions on page 7.

We have also been in discussions, first at meetings before the closure and then via Class Charts, about **the use** of mobile phones. All information and views were passed to Mr Preece and the Leadership team for discussion and this is the response from Mr Preece:

After a really strong consultation with our School Council around the use of mobile phones during the school day at Stewards, we have maintained our current stance but an emphasis on a more consistent approach from all is needed regarding the inappropriate use of phones. Pupils will still be allowed to bring a mobile to school and use it during break and lunch times but the phone must be switched off during lesson time.

One thing that was discussed was rather than removing mobile phones was having '**mobile free days**' for both staff and pupils once a half term. This is with a view to having a 'digital detox' something that is important for all of us. Further discussion will take place with the new Student Leadership Team and School Council in September.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those pupils who made a contribution to the topic, your opinion was valued and I hope you can see that we have responded accordingly.

Finally, I would like to thank all of you that have been involved in Pupil Voice work this year. I look forward to working with the new Student Leadership Team, School Council and Year 7s next term.



Phoenix Challenge



We are very excited to launch our Phoenix Challenge with you in September. The original idea for this came from discussions about having a 'Stewdent Profile' that provided a range of opportunities for all pupils. I spent time discussing this with School Council members to gauge their views and with those in mind and discussions with staff the Phoenix Challenge has evolved!

You have a lot of opportunities during your time at Stewards through the Phoenix Curriculum, Pupil Voice groups and a wide range of enrichment activities and we wanted a way to bring these together and highlight the importance of developing you as a whole child and not just focusing on your academic success. The DfE Character Education Framework Guidance November 2019 states that: "Access to character development opportunities in schools can lead pupils who take part to be highly motivated, report fewer absences and have lower levels of emotional distress, amongst other outcomes" (page 8).

You will have the chance to identify activities on the grid that you aim to complete. To achieve Bronze, Silver, Gold or Platinum you will need to complete a particular number of activities from each strand. The strands encompass our aims for all pupils:

- -participation in the academy community
- -learning above and beyond the curriculum
- -reading for pleasure and/or personal development
- -high aspirations
- -being an independent learner.

Recognition of participation or completion of an activity will be recorded and celebrated in a variety of ways. These may include; positive points, postcards, bookmarks, letters or certificates. You will be given a Record of Achievement folder that will be kept in your form room so you can store all of your certificates and so on. For each level that you achieve you will be awarded a certificate and a special lapel pin. The pins are currently in the final stages of their design.

We're really looking forward to launching this with you in the autumn term and hope you will be keen to get involved.

House System



The House System is designed to embody the values and ethos of Stewards and be an integral part of our school community. On entering Stewards all pupils become members of a House and are expected to do their best for it in their work in lessons and in their commitment to extra-curricular activities.

The aim is to provide every pupil in each house with the following:

- An opportunity to demonstrate the elements of 'COURAGE'.
- A sense of belonging within the school community.
- Opportunities to develop social, intellectual, physical and practical skills.
- A sense of achievement both inside and outside of the classroom.
- Fun and excitement through competition.
- Opportunities for leadership.
- An awareness of individual and collective responsibility.

At Stewards we are very proud of all the pupils and look to celebrate their achievements throughout each term. All pupils have the opportunity to earn Positive Points for their house on a daily basis. These points will be awarded for completing an excellent piece of work; for spontaneous acts of kindness; for meeting a personal target; representing the school and many more. House points will be collated weekly to recognise successes and at the end of the academic year all points will be tallied up to establish the house winning the overall trophy.

HOUSE ORGANISATION

Each house is made up of 10 tutor groups which are overseen by a Head of House. Each member of staff is also attached to a house that they will remain with during their time at Stewards. Each house will have designated Year 11 House Captain and two School Council representatives per form class to support. These pupils will act as representatives for all the pupils in their house throughout the year by; helping co-ordinate house teams, organise activities and events and represent their house at relevant meetings.

THE FOUR HOUSES

House of Bravery - represented by a jaguar emblem

House of Fortitude – represented by a lion emblem

House of Prowess – represented by a panther emblem

House of Valour - represented by a tiger emblem

There will be many house events throughout the year from all areas of school life. This blend ensures that everyone has the opportunity, pupils and staff alike, to represent their house in something that they enjoy, something they are good at or something that will challenge them outside their comfort zone.

When you return on your first day in September there will be plenty of information presented to you to ensure you understand how the new school day will work. A few key pieces of information to get you started are as follows:

- We will be back in uniform in September, so get ready to wear your phoenix with pride!
- Having your own equipment will be important, as we will have to avoid sharing our things.
- Each year group will start the day at a different time, so it is not too busy at the school gate.
- We will ask everyone to sanitise or wash their hands when they arrive, at every break and at lunch. Bring your own bottle of sanitiser to speed things up.
- You will follow a timetable as you have always done, but the timings will be different for each year group.
- At breaks and lunch you will be asked to stay in a predefined area with your year group (your 'bubble'); now will be a time to practice social distancing to keep everyone safe. Most breaks will now be half an hour, so plenty of time to catch up with friends.
- When moving around school, we will ask you to keep to one way systems and stay to the left. You will need to move sensibly at all times.
- You do not need to worry about having fallen behind with your work, as your teachers are ready to support you and there are plans to help you catch up.
- As always at Stewards, if you are feeling a little wobbly about returning, then there will be plenty support at hand. It is perfectly natural to lose your confidence when you haven't done something for some time. Your teachers may be feeling the same!
- Year 11 will be staying for Academic Prep until 4:30 on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.; your teachers wanted to support you in this important year.
- Clubs and activities may run after school but they will be only with one year group.
