






- Studying religion gives you the opportunity to explore some of the deepest and most significant ideas and values that have emerged in human history.
- Religion has been one of the most persistent forces in the history of humanity.
- With the rise of science, some think that religion is outdated, but it continues to exert its
 influence in profound ways throughout the world today. Think, for example, of the ongoing
 tensions in the Middle East, the debates over evolution, questions about abortion and the
 death penalty; how people think about these controversial issues reflects their religious
 convictions.
- Religion asks the deepest, most important questions about human existence.
- Where do we come from? Why are we here? What happens to us after we die? Why do
 people suffer? How should we act? How can we live good lives? How can we understand
 people with beliefs that conflict with our own? What is the ultimate meaning of life?
 Different religions provide a variety of answers to these questions. The study of religion
 gives you the opportunity to explore the range of answers to these profound questions and
 allows you to consider your own beliefs and values.
- People act out of their religious beliefs every day.
- Exploring the range of religious world views at work in the past and present is crucial for understanding what people do and why they do it.
- Religion affects all aspects of human existence.
- It is difficult to study history, anthropology, sociology, political science, literature, music, art, theatre, psychology, education, or economics without understanding how religious views and ideals function in culture. If you are interested in any of these areas, you might also want to consider a religion major or minor.



Lesson 5 What makes a person religious?

LI: To review what being religious means.

DARTS - What makes a person religious?

Belief in a spiritual dimension. Many people believe that there is more to being a human being than the physical body. They believe that there is an inner self that cannot be broken down into elements. It is a bit like electricity, you cannot see it, but you know it is there. Many religious people believe in life after death and some also believe that people have a soul or a spirit.

Belief that life is sacred. Most followers of religion believe that life is sacred. This means they believe that all life, including animals, should be treated with respect. For some people, this will mean thinking carefully about how they treat all life.

Belief that life has a meaning. Many religious people believe that life has a purpose. Following a religion helps them to make sense of their life. It helps them to deal with big questions such as 'why are we here?'. Some religious people believe that their purpose in life is to serve God and others. Others believe that they will continually be reborn into other lives until they have lived a life which is good enough to earn them heavenly bliss.





Worship Explained


- People like plants, we only see what is above the surface or the soil.

DARTS Task

Most—but not all—of the world's major religions are *theistic:* having as the basis of their practice a belief and faith in the existence of one or more deities, or gods, that are distinctly separate from mankind and with whom it is possible to have a relationship.

The term polytheism is based on the Greek roots poly (many) and theos (god). Thus, the term is used to describe belief systems in which several gods are acknowledged and worshiped. Throughout the course of human history, polytheistic religions of one sort or another have been the dominant majority. The classic Greek, Roman, Indian and Norse religions, for example, were all polytheisms.





Monotheism

The term monotheism comes from the Greek monos, (one) and theos (god). Thus, monotheism is the belief in the existence of a single god. Monotheism is typically contrasted with polytheism, which is a belief in many gods, and with atheism, which is an absence of any belief in any gods.

Monotheistic religions

- Christianity, Judaism, Sikhism and Islam are the monotheistic religions
- They believe in a single all powerful god
- These religions all developed in the middle east
- They share many festivals and rituals
- All of these religions share many stories and myths
- For example; the Jewish bible became a major part of the Christian bible, while Jesus, who was the founder of Christianity is considered a prophet (messenger for God) by Muslims.

Polytheistic religions

- Each god within a polytheism has control of a different nature of human activity
- for example; the god of fertility (ability to make a child)
- Gods that are closely linked with human life are usually the most popular and most worshipped
- Whilst Hinduism is described as a polytheism, it is said that all of the gods can be traced back to one overriding absolute force known as Brahman
- Brahman is the ultimate reality and is the origin of all creation.
