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
ROCKET CLUB

On 27th April 2023 our Rocket Club team took part in UK Youth Rocketry Challenge. The aim of this challenge was to fly a model rocket against strict rules and regulations. Flights were to be to a specified height (246m) and were to land in a specified time (42-45 seconds) carrying a payload of a one raw hens' egg that must return to earth fully intact.



From the beginning of the school year, students from all year groups were working hard on the design of their rockets to meet these challenging requirements. They had to choose the right material for the body, the right shape and size of fins and nose cone but also which motors to use and then build it. They also couldn't forget about the parachute recovery system.





Competition was fierce however, with over 40 teams competing in the South-East Region alone, so despite successful flights we narrowly missed out on a place in the National finals. The winner of that competition will go to the Paris Air show to compete with teams from USA, Japan and France.

Most parents dream of being buried by their child, This dream was crushed for Doreen and Neville Lawrence, On the 22nd of April 1993,


Their son Stephen was killed by a gang of white teenagers, At the hospital they asked...

Stewards were chosen by the OCR exam board to host the GCSE PE practical exams this year. Four other schools travelled to Stewards with their Year 11 GCSE PE students to be moderated in a wide range of different activities.

First up was trampolining, which Stewards did not have any students competing in, but Miss Venables was responsible for organising that activity. Next year we will have some students performing their routines for the moderation.

Next up were two students for Stewards, Coco and Katherine, who performed exceptionally well in the netball activity showing all their defensive skills as a goalkeeper and goal defence for both their core and advanced netball skills.

The next performance was badminton, organised by Mr Rayney where Harry, Frankie, Henry and Satu had to show their racket skills against their opponents from different schools, with Harry winning all his singles games against everyone.

Gabriel was the only Stewards' basketball player to be examined against the other basketball players, and he stood out as the best player on show (MVP), performing all the core and advanced basketball skills to earn top marks.

Next up was football, with Charlie and Edward out on pitch and Caleb playing in goal; despite having a knee injury, he performed exceptionally well, showing a full range of goalkeeping skills.

The last activity of the day was athletics; the first event was the 1500m in which William, Rachael and Harry were running. Katherine then had to throw the javelin after her 100m race. In the boys' 100m race, Gabriel once again stole the show by coming first, in a time of 11.5s to earn top marks for his athletics.

Debden Park came back into the game in the 2nd half, scoring two quick-fire goals to make it 3-2 after which they gained in confidence, and then scored a couple of more goals to make it 5-2.

It was a real testament to the teams character that Stewards kept going and got a goal back thanks to Jesse, and when Gabriel pushed up and scored the fourth goal the comeback seemed on, but as they pressed for the equaliser to force extra time they just ran out of time. MRS HINDS MRS EDWARDS



Stephen was born and grew up in Plumstead, South-east London, where he lived with his parents Neville and Doreen, his brother Stuart and sister Georgina. Like most young people, he juggled an active social life, schoolwork, family commitments, and part-time employment

What happened to Stephen?

Stephen was murdered in a racially motivated attack, by a gang of white youth while waiting for a bus in Well Hall Road, Eltham, with his friend DuWayne Brook on the evening of 22 April 1993. He was 18 years old. SEND Inclusion Award

We are delighted to inform our community that we are in the process of working towards obtaining the SENDIA -SEND Inclusion Award. This award will enable us as a school to deliver high quality education for pupils with SEND. Compliant with the SEND Code of Practice, the award framework focuses on removing barriers to learning through early identification, inclusive teaching, and effective leadership. It will also allow us to evaluate impact to improve classroom practice and pupil outcomes.

Successful completion of the award will enable schools to:

- Gain recognition for high-quality education and care for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities
- Demonstrate to all stakeholders that the school provision complies with current legislation and the SEND Code of Practice, and is effective in achieving good outcomes for all pupils.

What will it include?

- Create a working group that will be made up of representatives from all groups with an interest in SEND education. (Staff, students, governors, and parents).
- Self-Evaluation of the school centred on characteristics of the school, Ofsted rating and Pupil/Parent/Staff Voice.
- Creating an Action Plan with a comprehensive evidence portfolio to demonstrate our compliance with the Key Performance Indicators and Objectives.
- Visit from an assessor to verify that the objectives have successfully been met.

How will it help?

The award will help us to develop high quality SEND provision throughout the school by:

- Promoting awareness of SEND issues and inclusion for all stakeholders of Stewards Academy
- Promoting awareness to all students, including those not on the SEND register.
- Evaluating and improving classroom practices and interventions
- Developing a clear and inclusive support system focusing on improving student outcomes.


