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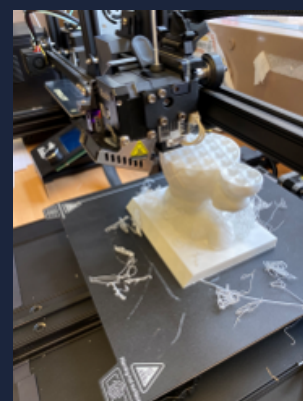
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PTI AWARD

DEPARTMENT FOCUS

Being part of the Technology team is such a privilege to us at Stewards. We get to see the smiles on pupils faces when they receive those higher grades they may not have got in theory-based subjects. We get to teach skills for life and capture enjoyment through designing and making.

We asked our new Year 7 class, *Why do we do Design & Technology?* The responses included "everything we can see, and touch has been designed and made by someone" and "to inspire the future generations". These statements, in a nutshell, is why we do what we do!

We'd also like to welcome back our KS4 pupils. We cannot wait to see your outcomes on your coursework. Our current Year 11s have been an amazing cohort of pupils so far and worked incredibly hard to achieve above and beyond our expectations across all our specialist DT subjects.

As we move forward and progress this year, we have been working on further embedding *Sustainability* into our department by introducing the new Y8 bottle top lamp project. We sent an announcement out in the summer, appealing for plastic bottle tops that we could melt down and mold into lampshades, and the response has been astounding! We thank the students and their parents for the efforts with this! This is building upon our already existing denim upcycle project, where the pupils and staff will donate old denim garments, to cut up and make into a new product. Alongside this, we aim to embed sustainability into our food technology rotation by re-using ingredients or food, prepared in a previous lesson, to cook a fresh healthy dish in the next. This is widely focused on in KS4. In KS3, the pupils are taught to cook from scratch, using fresh seasonal ingredients. Pupils can personalise their food by using additional ingredients bought in from home or accessing the wide range of herbs and spices available to them.

Keep up the hard work Technology pupils and keep your eyes peeled for more new and exciting opportunities that are coming soon!

Stewards Academy Visit WALES!



The Rainbow Project and Stewards Academy collaborated to send 12 brilliant young people to Wales on an adventure trip of a lifetime. Our students faced new experiences and they were challenged to overcome their own personal fears, for example, being afraid of the dark or heights. There was no rest upon arrival as the students were put to the test and their first challenge was to scale a mountain. This was something that many of the pupils hadn't expected after a long day of travelling in the minibus, but it turned into being one of the many highlights of the trip, with picturesque views and the students growing more confident after realising their own achievements. Social time in the evenings was an opportunity for all the students to bond together and was spent playing games, such as card games and races. On our second day, the pupils participated in Caving and were tested with their abilities to explore the hidden wonders of Wales. Many pupils hadn't expected to enjoy this activity, with some being anxious about the tight spaces but listening to their evening chatter, it was clear that many pupils felt that this experience was a 'once in a lifetime' moment. All the students wore exhausted smiles as they happily tried to predict the activities of the next day. On our third day, the pupils went canoeing in the nearby lake and some of our more courageous lads even enjoyed a chilly dip in the water. It was a wholesome moment to see that many of the students were coming out of their shells and becoming bolder by each passing day. By day four, an established routine had been made and the pupils were up and ready by 8am (yes - teenagers woke up before midday!) Our morning ritual consisted of making beds, setting up the dining room tables, having breakfast and cleaning up after ourselves. This was often followed by a competitive game or two of Uno and being informed of our daily activities. Our fourth day consisted of water gorging - another first for many pupils - and once again, Stewards Academy were challenged to face icy waters and we even had to climb up a waterfall! I cannot express how proud I was to see how the group had developed into a well-established team that would support each other and consistently demonstrated that they cared for their fellow adventurers. To truly enjoy nature's beauty, our little team had to push ourselves to exceed our own expectations and overcome the exhaustion to scale the rocks against the current. 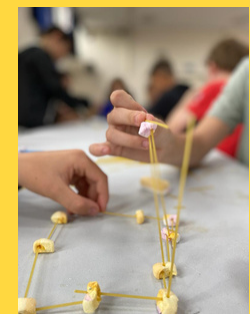

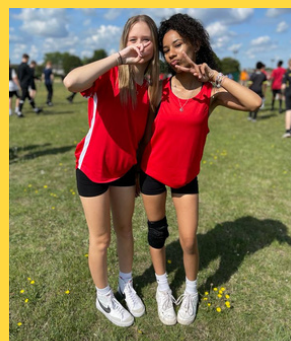
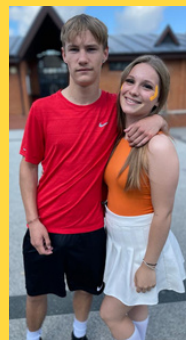

STEM - What's Going On In Our Science Department?

Year 8 have been learning Chemistry and about the reactivity of metals whilst Year 9 learned about Specialised Exchange System in living organisms and their adaptations by dissecting fish.

Year 9 have also been investigating certain biological processes such as Osmosis in plant tissues. Students have used potato tissues to measure the movement of water molecules across partially permeable membranes in plants by comparing percentage mass change of potato tissues in distilled water and different molarity of solutions.

Safeguarding, Mental Health & Wellbeing update

What a positive start to the new academic year!

I wanted to just emphasise two points which I'd like to remain a focus for us all; **safety and kindness**. It is imperative that you keep yourselves safe. It is also important to remember that if antisocial, illegal or unacceptable behaviour is occurring and you are there, you are guilty by association. Remove yourself from the situation and encourage others to do the same and, if necessary, report it.

Remember that when you are communicating with people via a chat platform online, gaming or on your mobile phone, you are not anonymous! Even if your username / profile picture bears no resemblance to your name or appearance, everything you do is traceable. Please bear this in mind when sending messages or participating in group chats. Be conscious of the subject matter and of the language you choose to use. Every message you send can be screenshot and shared and kept indefinitely. If you don't want that, don't send it. Be kind – to yourself and others.

We should all work together to drive out unkind and bullying behaviour, it has no place in our community here at Stewards.
